#### Real Ale at **Belladrum 2014**

Tom Jones, Razorlight, Billy Bragg, Capercaillie and over 50 other acts

filled the stages at this year's event near Beauly. A sell out 16,000 attended over

the weekend of 8<sup>th</sup> and 9<sup>th</sup> August, making this the largest music event in the north of Scotland since (the misnamed) RockNess at Dores was cancelled this year. We were asked to run a bar in a new area called the Walled Garden, as the organisers extend the

Real ale was also at the long established, Black Isle Bar, between the Grassroots Stage and the Main Stage, where they had Yellow Hammer and Red Kite. A big thank you is due to those that volunteered to serve the beers and the breweries for loaning us equipment and their support.




So far, in the 2014 Champion Beer of Scotland competition, several of "our" breweries have done

**Orkney IPA.** Cairngorm won the Stout category with **Black Gold**. Highland came 2nd with **Sneaky**

Orkney brewery's Dark Island Reserve, a bottled,

10% whisky cask matured version of Dark Island, has gained a 3 Gold Star Rating for a 2nd time at The Great Taste Awards—the "Oscars" of fine food and drink in Britain. The brewery has also started supplying it in smaller, 330ml bottles. Available in all good stores including Tomlinson's Beer Shop.



### Another new bar in Academy Street?

The Inverness Courier reports that Bruce Mac-Gregor, the well known, local, folk musician is seriously looking at opening a licenced venue at the end of Academy Street opposite The Iron-Works. This might be in conjunction with Brew-Dog. The building, with a very large cellar, is owned by Bruce's father, Brian. Planning permission has still to be sought, so this could take some time. Along with the renewed Phoenix Ale House and Cairngorm's A I Welders building (where disappointingly, nothing has happened yet) Academy Street should become the happening area of the town centre and Blackfriars will surely be revamped as well.



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#### **Hebridean Celtic** Festival 2014 (HebCelt)

For the second year running, Loch Ness Brewery had a bar at this event. This time they took 9 of their beers over; LightNESS, DarkNESS, SaaziNESS, RedNESS, Hoppy-NESS, WilderNESS, MadNESS, LochNESS and CaithNESS, putting them on in rotation on 6

The event was headlined by Donnie Munro on Thursday, Big Country on Friday and Levellers on Saturday. There were 36 acts on in the main area over the 3 days plus some other concerts around the Island. This year there were 3 stages; Main stage,

Islands Stage and new for this year, Acoustic Stage which was in the Loch Ness Brewery tent.

A group called Boomerang which was formed as part of the Commonwealth Games cultural events and featured Scotland's Breabach with musicians from New Zealand and Australia were particularly good with pipes playing alongside the didgeridoo and Gaelic and Hakka chant together.

The other artists included Cara Dillon. Duncan Chisholm, Rura and Larkin Poe. Amongst those on the Accoustic stage was guitarist Sophie Rogers who had just won a competition to sing her own songs at Heb Celt and Keith Meisner who had his Andy Murray songs made famous on BBC recent-

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
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#### Isle of Skye trip

On a day that dawned bright it was a little disappointing to only have eleven places filled for a trip that was always a sell out before, but good to see a couple of new faces. Nevertheless, it was a happy bus that left the Inverness Townhouse at 9am to pick up a couple more at Drumnadrochit before aiming for an 11am stop at the Sligachan Hotel on Skye. The Slig is the home to the 5 barrel Cuillin Brewery and a few folk had a brewery tour with head brewer Eric Jones. It was good to see the full range on show in the bar, namely Black Face, Eagle, Skye and Pinnacle. I opted for the Black Face which is a 4.3% dark ale and described as stout like but one which I would say is more a like a mild, albeit a bit stronger than the norm for that style. On good form it was worthy of a solid 3 on the CAMRA beer scoring scale. I think all the other beers were tried by the party with the 4.7% Pinnacle being particularly well received.

Time was pressing to leave for a brand new ale outlet, the Flodigarry Country House Hotel at Staffin. This magnificent country house commands fabulous views over Staffin Bay and offers 18 guest rooms, 11 in the main house and 7 in the adjoining Flora Macdonald cottage. The bar area has recently been tastefully restored and refurbished with respect. Three ales feature from the Isle of Skye Brewery and as a change from mass produced lager there is **Eilean Or** keg from the brewery. On cask there were the rebranded Isle of Skye ales **Skye Red** and **Skye Black**. To be fair I would say they were still finding their feet on the ale front and both ales scored 2.5 from me but the enthusiasm about the ales and the care that has gone into the refurb is worthy of 5 out of 5.

As ever it was time to press on and for me, onto one of my two favourite places on Skye, namely the Isle of Skye brewery.

I only joined CAMRA since moving to Scotland some twelve years ago and despite drinking only ale from my late teens never felt the urge to join until I arrived here, really on the back of picking up a Highland CAMRA newsletter all those years ago (I liked the cut of their jib then, because, as now I would like to think, they focused on the ale, the breweries and the pubs. All of which are at the heart of what really matters on the ale front.) Sorry, went off at a tangent then, reminiscing, due to seeing a photo of me from some ten years ago on the brewery shop wall looking decidedly younger and thinner.

Part of the fun for me at the brewery is the Leann Failte, the "welcome ale". This is two Isle of Skye ales blended in an unknown proportion which we have to guess from taste alone. Needless to say, all the trained tasters present failed miserably and it was our magazine editor who got the least wrong answer, winning for himself a case of beer. The ale was a blend of two thirds Hebridean Gold and one third Skye Black. As well as a tasty buffet, generously laid on by Angus &

Pam from the brewery, there was a brewery tour for those who had not been round before, accompanied by a brand new ale, **Skye IPA**. This 4.5% brew has been made with sorachi hops and unlike a few recent IPA styles which have been very hop dominant, this one was much closer to style being very well balanced with a good malty background and body complimented with the flavoursome hops. As the number of pubs that we visit on the island has increased over the years (good) our time spent at the brewery has got less (bad) and it was soon time to move on.

A quick stop to the nearby Uig Hotel found three IOS ales on. The **Heb Gold** was past its best and was happily swopped for **Skye Black** (2.5). **Young Pretender** (1) was also on. Maybe a bit early in the season to run with three ales or we were just unlucky, as a few weeks later I was sent a glowing report from a visiting CAMRA member who took the time to tell us how much he enjoyed "the wonderful pint of IOS **IPA** he had at the Uig Hotel".

A bit of a journey to our next stop, the Stein Inn at Waternish, my other favourite place on Skye. Supping an ale on a warm, sunny day sitting in front of the Stein is one of the great pleasures in life! After presenting owner Angus with his certificate for North Skye & Hebrides Pub of the Year 2014, we enjoyed **Skye Black** (3.5) and Harvestoun **Schiehallion** (4.5).

A slightly shorter journey to our next stop, the Old Inn at Carbost, a cosy inn on the shores of Loch Harport near to the Talisker distillery. Here they had brews from both the Skye breweries, IOS Young Pretender (2) and Cuillin Black Face (3) and I think Cuillin Skye Ale. Onto our final stop of the day which was the Cluanie Inn. We were greeted with two LocAles from Lochness Brewery and they were on fine form with HoppyNess (4.5) and WilderNess (4). All too soon it was time to leave again for the long drag home, stopping in Drum to offload the folk we picked up on the way out, enjoying a couple more excellent ales in The Benleva, before arriving back in town for around half eight. Many thanks to our driver from Fraser's coaches who, as always, gave us a safe and pleasant journey. Our usual thanks & appreciation to Isle of Skye Brewery for their hospitality, thanks also to Cuillin Brewery and to all the visited pubs for a splendid day out. HBH

well worth a visit—whether you were planning to be in Nairn or not! Ted and Paula Sharp.










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


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
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
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Sir,

when is a new beer really new? I refer to the article reporting the spring Wetherspoon's beer festival (WYT Summer 2014 p13) which quoted the festival programme stating that Meridian from Orkney Atlas was new. As the Orkney Brewery BLO, I can report that prior to the Orkney Atlas merger under the ownership of Highlands & Island Breweries, the Atlas Brewery produced Meridian. The original brew was 4% ABV, tawny, toasted malty and having spicy notes - in contrast to the current 3.9% ABV, having an aroma of toasted malt and fruit notes leading to smooth, nutty malt flavours, balanced by a crisp hop bitterness. Different enough to be a new brew? You decide.


Thanks Richard, always happy to be corrected—this magazine wouldn't be complete without at least 1 mistake! - Ed.

I know in the Huddersfield area, we've got some decent pubs a bit out of the way and it's difficult to keep them all up to date (for branch and CAMRA info) and get enough scores to base GBG selection on. So I always try to score, and update if necessary, when visiting other areas. I have to admit that in Scotland, I don't tend to try pubs not showing as serving real ale as the absence of handpumps doesn't mean there isn't cask ale, but it'd be a drag to ask each time, particularly when some areas have a low penetration of

cask ale. I recognise the need for cask breathers when the sales are not big enough to support cask ale, though at least those I've had have been a bit stale, though certainly not off. I wonder if serving one beer normally might be better than two via the cask breather. But others might have a different view about variety over quality, and I'm only one brief visitor. But I guess there may have already been an article on that though! I'm afraid I never saw a 'What's Yours then?' I have seen one on a previous visit to the West Highlands. Jim.

(Thanks for that Jim. We had a wee problem with distribution to the far West of our area this summer.—Ed.)

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### Aberdeen and North East Beer Festival

Held again this year at Pittodrie Stadium in Aberdeen from 29<sup>th</sup> to 31<sup>st</sup> May. A couple of very late cancellations meant 98 different beers were available from the start.

There were six brews from this year's featured brewery Cromarty, which

had won the Beer of the Festival for the last two years with **Happy Chappy** – will it make a hat trick? Umm..... the *Ghost Town* Porter and *Rogue Wave* were very good.

There were plenty of Scottish brews (from Shetland to Dumfries), four Welsh brews (New Plassey *Midnight*, Otley *09 Blonde*, Purple Moose *Dark* 

**Buzz** from Cairngorm, the new *Skye* IPA from Isle of Skye, *Crazy* **Daze** from Potbelly, **Stout Hearted** from Yeovil. *Jack Back* from Stewarts and CaithNESS from Loch Ness? There was also a very good selection of Cider and Perry and a large

selection of continental bottles.
As the beers finished the Bar Managers were very busy bringing forward a second cask. On the Friday evening, some could go on, some needed more settling time.

At the start of Saturday there were 72 different beers, 9 different ciders/ perrys and a large number of bottles still left. The Festival Charity for this

year was Inspire—empowering the life choices of hundreds of adults, young people and children with learning disabilities and additional support needs in North East Scotland.

On the Thursday afternoon the CAM-

RA Champion Strong Bitter of Scotland final took place. Six judges went through the final 6 beers not knowing which they were and then their scores were added up.

The winner was Cairngorm *Wildcat*, 2<sup>nd</sup> was Cromarty *Rogue Wave* and 3<sup>rd</sup> was Highland *Orkney IPA*. The first cask to run out was Windswept *Wiezen*—a cloudy wheat beer with some cloves and loads of bananas and pear drops. *Weizen* also went on to win the Beer of the Festival as voted for by the drinkers.

A very good festival and plans are in progress for next year, which will be on between the 4th and 6th of June 2015.





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


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## Official CAMRA Tasting Course August 2014

Our second tasting course of the year was held at The Benleva Hotel in Drumnadrochit on 16th August. One problem was an accident on A82 between Inverness and Drum with the road closed for a few hours meant some people never made it. Eric Mills went through the full tasting notes with samples of sweet, sour and salt along with different hops and malts. There was also talk on the different styles of beers and how beers get into competitions. Beers tasted were Loch Ness InverNESS their new 4.5% goldenamber bitter; Loch Ness LochNESS a 4.4% malty sweetish 80/- style brew; Loch Ness **LightNESS** a 3.9% light refreshing golden hoppy bitter; Highland **Dark Munro** a 4% malty mild; Windswept Weizen a 5.2% German style wheat beer full of bananas and pear drops with a hint of spices. Thanks to Steve at the Benleva for his hospitality.

For a brewery's beer to be entered into CAMRA competitions, several things are needed. The beer has to be entered in to CAMRA's Brewery Information System by a brewery's Brewery Liaison Officer, with as much detail as possible including the beer's Original Gravity measurement. CAMRA tasting cards need to be filled in for the beer with a reasonable spread across the year and from as many establishments as possible. Lastly, the beer needs to be voted for by CAMRA members in the brewery's CAMRA region—for us here in the Highlands, that is the Scotland & Northern Ireland region. We will be able to vote on the CAMRA BOTY website from the 1st of October to the 30th of November. Because of the hacking problems with the CAMRA website, please look in What's Brewing for details but last year's site was www.camrabreweryinfo.org.uk/ cbobvoting/login.asp

#### **Breweries News**

As part of CAMRA's support for real ale and real ale breweries, volunteers from among the branch membership can be Brewery Liaison Officers. BLOs keep in contact with "their" brewery, encouraging and if appropriate, advising.

BLOs are asked to make a progress report to CAMRA every 3 months, via the CAMRA website.

In Highlands & Western Isles branch, we now have 11 or 12 breweries. Our magazine is also quarterly so what follows is the news we have over the past 3 months.

After the last edition, when I reported that we didn't have BLOs for a few of our breweries, we have been overwhelmed with the response of ....... 1! Many thanks for your efforts Jim.

Other CAMRA branch magazines publish news from their breweries written by the breweries themselves. This is free publicity to the very customer base that you want to appeal to.

Some of our breweries don't even have a CAMRA member on their staff but we would be happy to take any news you care to pass on to us—see the contact info on the diary page.

#### **Cromarty Brewing Co**;

Still recovering from having a presence at the Black Isle Show and sponsoring one of the very



small stages at Belladrum, Cromarty were one of the local breweries at North Hop. They are also having a stall at the world sheep dog trials at Fern Farm. Craig is having a 2nd go at the Kiwi juice infused wheat beer *KiWheat* which will be available only in bottles and keg. They took delivery of a 2nd, bigger delivery van in June and the year continues to busily fly by.

#### Black Isle Brewing Company;

4 more conditioning tanks are arriving soon to cope



with increased export market especially to USA, Japan and Italy. Not just bottles but in the 1-way KeyCasks. Another successful Belladrum for them at their bar next to the Grassroots Stage which they sponsor. Their Moctoberfest (music, beers and food) will have happened again in September.

#### Loch Ness Brewery;

At the beginning of July Loch Ness Brewery took on Rob Jenner as their Sales Director. Rob is well known in the real ale world and has been



selling mainly in the central belt for many years. Previously with Harvieston, Caledonian, Isle of Skye, Inveralmond and Fyne, he retired in 2013. His other passion is Jaguar cars which takes up a lot of his time. However, he had some spare time and decided to take on the role with The Loch Ness Brewery on a part time basis. Mentioned elsewhere in the magazine, their 5% HoppyNESS came 3rd in the British finals of the Strong Bitter category at the Great British Beer Festival this August—the only Scottish beer to get an award this year. A new beer called *InverNESS* is now out. It is a 4.5% golden semi-sweet bitter. The brewery has taken on local man James MacLennan on a part time basis to help out with their increasing workload. They had a bar at North Hop at Eden Court at the end of August. Along with the Windswept Brewery they are sponsoring a once a month, lunchtime theatre called Play-Pieces (see advert) which highlights artists, all from or based in the Highlands. These are to be held at the Pheonix in Inverness and the Drouthy Cobbler in Elgin over the next 7 months and cost £10 a ticket which includes a local beer and lunch. Their first export to Singapore is imminent.

#### **Hebridean Brewing Company Ltd;**

Andy has confirmed to us that the Brewery has moved a short distance to much larger premises at 10 Shell St. It is all set to start brewing again with greater capacity and has permis-



sion to open a visitor centre.

The relocation comes after a few years when Andy was unwell, and the brewery was essentially closed.

Now trading as the Hebridean Brewing Company Ltd, the premises will be called "Edge of the World Brewery", and is directly across from the CalMac ferry terminal and Andy is hoping that visitors may make the new Brewery one of their first (or last?) ports of call!

#### **Highlands & Islands Brewers in 2014**

**Isle of Skye Brewery** - Based at Uig, by the Western Isles ferry terminal, brewing since December 1995. Started major expansion and rebranding in 2013. (see advert)

**Valhalla Brewery** - Most northerly brewery in the UK, brewing on Unst since December 1997. Ales include White Wife and Auld Rock.

**Black Isle Brewery** - Started brewing in December 1998 in converted farm buildings. Ales include Red Kite and Yellowhammer. Organic ales are a speciality. Much enlarged, new brewery opened 2011. Concentrates on large scale bottling.

**Isle of Arran Brewery** - Located close to Brodick Castle. Opened in late March 2000. Ales include Blonde, Dark, and Sunset. Expansion and rebranding started in 2013.

**Fyne Ales Brewery** - Based in Argyll, at the head of Loch Fyne, brewing started on St Andrew's Day 2001. Ales include Jarl and Maverick. Brewery refocused and expanded in 2012. Further expansion underway.

**Cairngorm Brewery Company** - Set up in late 2001. Ales include Trade Winds, Wildcat, Stag, Highland IPA, and Black Gold. Seasonal ales are regularly brewed. Expanded in 2011 and still expanding in 2013. Much expanded and improved brewery shop opened in late 2013. (see advert)

**Hebridean Brewing Company** - Based at Stornoway in the Outer Hebrides. Brewing since January 2002. Beers include Islander Strong Ale, Berserker Export Pale Ale, and Clansman Ale (first ale ever brewed in Stornoway) and now Seaforth. 2014—Not currently Brewing—moving.

**River Leven**—Brewing in one of the old Alcan smelter buildings in Kinlochleven since 2011.

**An Teallach Brewery** - Moved to the family's croft, near Dundonnell, in March 2001. Ales include An Teallach Ale, Beinn Dearg Ale, and Crofter's Pale Ale among others. Greatly expanded in 2012.

**Islay Ales Co Ltd** - Established in an old Tractor Shed in Bridgend, in March 2004. Ales include Finlaggan, Black Rock, and Dun Hogs Head; plus seasonal brews.

**Cuillin Brewery** - The brewery was born on 10<sup>th</sup> September 2004, in the old public bar of the Sligachan Hotel. Skye, Eagle, Pinnacle, Black Face, and Glamaig Ales are brewed. Started offering bottled beer in 2013.

**Highland Brewing Company** - Located in the old Swannay cheese factory at Birsay, on Orkney Mainland. Well regarded ales include Scapa Special, Orkney Blast, Dark Munro among others.

**Sinclair Breweries Ltd** - Formed in 2006 by local hotelier and restaurateur Norman Sinclair, who purchased the **Orkney** - which originally com-

menced brewing in 1988 at the Old Schoolhouse in Sandwick on Orkney mainland—and **Atlas** Breweries. Ales regularly brewed include Three Sisters, Latitude, and Nimbus from Atlas;

plus Raven Ale, Dark Island, Red MacGregor, and Skull Splitter from Orkney. Much expanded in 2011—12. (see advert)

**Glenfinnan Brewery** - irregularly brewing on a 4 bbl plant since October 2006 - Regular brews are Glenfinnan Gold, The Standard Ale, and Glenfinnan Dark (for the Winter).

**Colonsay Brewery** - First brews in March 2007. IPA, 80/- and Lager (Limited real ales).

**Plockton Brewery** - The first brew was produced on 1<sup>st</sup> April 2007. Crags Ale and Starboard IPA may usually be found in Plockton, and at other local outlets.

**Oban Bay Brewery** - Brewing since mid 2009. 5 barrel brewery attached to Cuan Mor.

**Old Inn (Gairloch) Brewery** - 100 litre microbrewery. First brews in February 2010.

**Loch Ness Brewery** - First brews in September 2011. RedNess, HoppyNess, Dark...... Etc. New, bigger brewery in 2012. Expanding again in 2014/15. (see advert)

**Cromarty Brewery** - First brews in December 2011. Ales include Happy Chappy, Brewed Awakening, Red Rocker, Hit The Lip, AKA and a growing portfolio. Increased brewing kit in early 2013. Brewery shop now open. (see advert)

**Spey Valley Brewery**—a "nano brewery" started in 2012 producing 5 cask conditioned real ales—found round and about the Keith area.

**Windswept Brewery**—started commercial brewing in 2012 in the Lossiemouth area. Blonde, APA and Wolf are proving popular along with Tornado and Weizen.

**Speyside Craft Brewery**—started commercial brewing at Forres in 2012. Bottlenose Bitter, Randolph's Leap, Moray IPA and Bow Fiddle Blond are the ale portfolio so far.

Not all of the breweries listed are in our branch area: the Highland Brewing Co, Valhalla, Orkney, Spey Valley, Windswept and Speyside are all in the Aberdeen, Grampian & Northern Isles area; the Arran Brewery falls in the Ayrshire & Galloway area; while Fyne, Islay, Colonsay & Oban Bay Breweries are covered by Glasgow & West Scotland.

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

Staying on the West Coast, Gille Brighde (the Gaelic for Oystercatcher) at Lower Diabaig were offering two keg Loch Ness beers, and an excellent selection of bottled beer. A fantastic drive to get there. One of our members from Nairn was in Fort Augustus and found Loch Ness available at Stravaigers Lodge. Loch Ness ales can also be found at The Great Glen Water Park, South Laggan. You do not have to be a resident to call in at either bar. Loch Ness ales can also be found at Polchar Inn and its sister pub. Am Politician, both South Uist. Loch Ness ales are also now available in the Caledonian in Inverness.

We understand that almost 2 years after their refurbishment, The Gellions, one of the most popular pubs here in Inverness, has at last put in an ale pump again and is offering Cromarty *Happy Chappy*. As mentioned elsewhere in this magazine, Eddie MacRae at Golspie Inn has confirmed he has had

Loch Ness *CaithNESS* since the beginning of August. The Winking Owl in Aviemore was closing but we have been told that Cairngorm Brewery (or a connected company) have bought it from Star Pubs and Bars (Heineken).

In a hugely ironic (and amusing for us) move, Blackfriars has had it's Heineken font removed as it just didn't sell! (Blackfriars is owned by Star Pubs and Bars)

Kings Highway now open until 1 am every day joining the Castle Tavern, The Pheonix Ale House, The Gellions and Johnny Foxes as post midnight ale pubs, although Sunday closing may vary at some of these. The Westford Inn at Kirkibost, North Uist is on the market and whilst still open, it is at irregular times. We understand that food is no longer available. If you are going to visit, please phone them (01876 580635) first.

Sadly, The Station Hotel, Avoch, one of our pubs in the 2014 GBG, after more than a year of increasingly strange alterations, closed its doors as a pub on Wednesday 6 Aug and is now a guest house. We understand that the premises is on the market and we are hoping that if it is bought, it may reopen as a public house again and be restored as the only pub for the Avoch community.



I tend to not go for malty beers, or the mass produced English golden ales that seem to have flooded 'our' market. My favourite breweries are Cromarty, Windswept, Loch Ness and York. You can always wake me up for a pint of Red Rocker though.

#### Q. What is your favourite style of pub?

A. A pub with good beer and live music. I have to also say I am impressed with the feel of the 'new' Phoenix.

#### Q. What hobbies/interest do you have?

A. Beer, wine, reading, but most of all listening to music, going to gigs and finding new bands/ genres.

#### Q. What is your favourite song/singer/group?

A. Impossible to say. I go through prolonged phases. What I can guarantee is that none of our readers will have heard of most of the musicians I listen to. At the moment I am in a pagan-folk phase ( just went to a 3 day music festival in Holland with our esteemed editor, it was wonderful) and listened to Faun from Germany, The Moon and the Night Spirit from Hungary, Cesair from Holland, and Euzen from Denmark, amongst many others. The two constants in my life are prog rock (way too many to mention, but White Willow are my absolute favourites) and classical. I immensely dislike rap and hip hop.

#### Q. Favourite film?

A. The World According to Garp (with Robin Williams).

#### Q. Favourite book?

A. Ratner's Star by Don DeLillo (An early novel from much celebrated De-Lillo, in which his characteristically powerful prose invites the reader into the mysterious, mind-blowing, mathematical world of the future—Amazon)

## Q. What is your favourite part of Scotland?

# Change in Branch Boundaries

The Scottish & Northern Ireland Branches of CAMRA have recently carried out a review of postcodes associated with each branch. The review has corrected minor (admin) errors, anomalies and minor "tweaks" have also been made.

Now formally included in the Highlands & Western Isles CAMRA area are:-Morven Peninsula (PA80), was Glasgow & West of Scotland (G&WoS) but has been in the Highland Council administrative area since 1976. It was thought that the 200 places forming the community were all homes. However, a quick search revealed Lochaline Hotel which although does not sell real ale (yet) does have an excellent selection of bottled beers.

Ballachulish, Glencoe & Kinlochleven (PH49 & 50) as with a realignment of the civil boundaries in 1976, these post-codes have historically been in G&WoS although the Clachaig Inn has made a regular appearance in the H & WI section of the Good Beer Guide—it was not in "our" section but it is now! Accordingly, we now welcome:-Laroch Bar, Ballachulish; Ice Factor, MacDonald Hotel and River Leven Brewery, Kinlochleven:

Leven Brewery, Kinlochleven; Clachaig Inn and Kings House Hotel, Glencoe to The Highlands & Western Isles CAMRA area.

This will also have the knock-on effect of slightly increasing the number of CAMRA members in our branch which currently stands at 230.

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## The Travels of the "Hillman Imp" and other ramblings.

Part 1

March saw the Hillman Imp heading off to Islay & Jura to do a bit of hillwalking on Jura. Travelling on the way to the Islay ferry we just happened to see signs for the Arrochar Beer Festival and since. for once, the Hillman Imp was a good hour ahead of schedule and very thirsty, we made a wee stop. It was the first Arrochar Beer Festival and congratulations to the organisers. It was a great wee festival with, if I remember correctly, 12 Scottish ales on tap. As the Imp was driving he only got to taste 2 but Mrs Imp had at least 4. We thought at the time we really should remember these ales, but of course we didn't and so the Imp decided that from then on he would take notes on his travels and share them with other thirsty souls. Filled with horror by "Twitface" and "Faceplook" he thought why not share them with other likeminded folk who visit or stay in the Highlands and Islands.

The only place on Islay we were able to find real ale on tap was the Port Charlotte Hotel. They had 2 well kept beers



on tap. A local brew *Finlaggan Ale* 3.7% (Islay Ales) (3) and *Golden Best* 3.5% (Timothy Taylor) which was quite exceptional (4.5). This place is a wee gem. Unfortunately we didn't have time to stop in Oban but went straight on to Inverness. We were staying in the town centre and were truly spoiled. The problem here was the choice of great ales on tap. We went in turn to The Castle Tavern, Blackfriars and the newly re-opened



Phoenix.

The smell of newly applied paint in The Phoenix did little to detract from the 10



real ales on tap. The highlights were *Happy Chappy* 4.1% (Cromarty Brewing Co.) and Cairngorm *Mountain Blue* 4.3% (both 4.5). The best ales at The Castle Tavern were *Landlord* 4.3% (Timothy Taylor) and *Trade Winds* 4.3% (Cairngorm Brewery) (again 4.5). Of

those we sampled in Blackfriars, Windswept *Blonde* 4% (Lossiemouth) was an absolute peach and was our overall winner of the week (5).

On the way back home we stopped at the Eagle Barge, the floating pub at Laggan Locks. We had passed this many a



time and thought we should go in but we were usually travelling north and passed on. This time we stopped. It's a really cosy wee pub with 4 beers on tap. We sampled the River Leven *Blonde* 4% (3) and the *Corncrake* 4.1% (Orkney). The Corncrake was really good (4) and the chilli we had with it was brilliant! Our next trip north was at the Easter Weekend. River Leven *Blonde* at the Grog and Gruel (4), a regular haunt in



Fort Bill, fair hit the spot. Then it was on down to The Glenelg Inn. Three taps



with 2 beers on, *Deuchars IPA* 3.8%, which I find hard to rate due to early overload in my real ale conversion (3) and Caledonian *Golden XPA* (4), which was nice and fresh, washed the great grub down a treat.

The first weekend in May saw the biannual trip of our hill crowd to Cannich where the 16 of us and another group drank the Slater's Arms dry of both *Tradewinds* (4) and *Stag* 4.1% (4) over the holiday weekend. Both beers were in great condition. Well done to the Slaters Arms in what used to be a real ale desert.



A sad state of affairs that this freehouse didn't have a real ale on when it was so busy at the height of the tourist season. Along to the Ferry Boat Inn which we were interested to see how it has improved under it's new stewardship of Nigel and Franner who keep the Argyll. We were not disappointed—nicely busy and offering 4 ales from South of the border which we assume are on the



Punch ale list. We tried *Hop Fest* from Red Squirrel (1.5),



Black Sheep *Best Bitter (*2.5) and
Robinson's *Troop*-

er (by Iron Maiden) (3).

Up the steep hill to the Argyll and the main target for our trip, as they had one of their festival weekends on. This particular weekend was their "Cider Celebration". The ales were Caledonian **80/-** (3), which used to be a very common ale across North East Scotland but



is rarely seen here, Robinson's *Trooper* (3)



and the new McEwan's IPA (2).



The bar area and lounge were pretty busy despite there being no sign of any cider but we did eventually spot an A4 card with a substan-

tial list of available ciders and perrys.

There was also live entertainment laid on for the weekend which was just starting (an hour late) by the time we had to get back on the bus.

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

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For the 29th and 30th of August, the One Touch Theatre in Eden Court was transformed into a large, open lounge bar. Wonderfully simple seating was provided by using hay bales at lines of tables with cleverly adapted whisky barrels for verti-

endless, ongoing, arguments within CAMRA but I am just reporting my very limited experiment. There were many live, local, music acts appearing on stage throughout the festival and the whole thing was expertly and enthusiastically MC'd by STV's Nicola McAlley.

Upstairs, there was a nicely laid out artisan gins and cocktails bar with a small, "Botanical" DJ stage. The corridor had some locally produced food, including lovely, big Scotch Eggs made from rare breed pork, superb "Haggis Bobotie's" from

Loch Ness Inn, ice cream and sorbets. In addition to the food there were stalls with cocktail kits and a Brew Craft Beer kit which included everything to make 4 litres of ale from a proper mash brew.

So, all in all, an excellent first attempt at showcasing craft beer to a new audience. A very pleasant, atmosphere around the whole festival with the bonus of being backed up by the excellent facilities and staff of Eden Court. There was a steady flow of people coming in—the venue had a capacity of 400. It didn't get crowded and

perhaps the entry price was putting people off (£15 for the Friday night and £20 for the Saturday—this included a festival glass and a third of a pint of the festival ale) but those that were there enjoyed themselves and it was noticeable that the majority were thirty-somethings and there were many women. Quite different from a CAMRA beer festival.

Well done, main organiser Michelle Russell and her team for putting this ambitious festival together. There is word of other, similar festivals happening at other venues. Hopefully, North Hop will be repeated next year.



cal drinking spotted about. We were invited as guests with 2 weekend tickets. Windswept brewery had a stand and provided the festival brew—a 3.7% dark, copper coloured, easy drinking ale—the lowest abv ale they have produced. "Our" local breweries were ably represented by Cromarty and Loch Ness. Loch Ness was launching their new InverNESS, 4.5% golden bitter. It was also good to see 6°N from Stonehaven, Eden brewery from St Andrews, Deeside Brewery from Banchory, Williams Bros Brewing Co. from Alloa, Inveralmond from Perth, Strathbraan from Dunkeld and BrewDog from Ellon. Cider was provided

by the full range of Thistly Cross at their stand. One of us tried the Jaggy Thistle, the 7.4%, CAMRA approved, Scottish real scrumpy which had a good, sharp, dryness but with a very smooth undertone. As this festival was designed to be a showcase for Craft Beer, about 30 of the 50 available beers were on keg. This reporter tried quite a few ales and 2 or 3 of the keg beers. I have to report that the kegged beers were not too fizzy and if they were too chilled, I just waited until they warmed up a bit to get the great, full—on flavours. The "Craft keg" debate is one of the



#### Drink in a Real Ale Pub? - Rate the Beer!

Highlands & Western Isles CAMRA needs your help in surveying the pubs in our massive Branch area. To tell us which pubs are worth considering for the Good Beer Guide, use CAMRA's 6-point NBSS (National Beer Scoring Scheme) to record Beer Quality. The info you give us helps us judge which outlets could go in to The Good Beer Guide, which outlets merit an award of area POTY and Branch POTY and which of our local beers merits the award of BOTY. It's easy! (if you are not sure about your score for a beer—half scores are fine—i.e.  $1^1/2$  for an OK beer but you wouldn't have another pint)

#### What do the scores mean?

- 0- No cask ale available.
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> **Undrinkable**. Beer so poor you have to take it back or can't finish it.
- **1 Poor**. Beer that is between barely drinkable and drinkable with considerable resentment.
- **2 Average**. Competently kept, drinkable pint but doesn't inspire in any way, not worth moving to another pub but you drink the beer without really noticing.
- **3 Good**. Good beer in good form. You may cancel plans to move to the next pub. You want to stay for another pint and may seek out the beer again.
- 4-Very Good. Excellent beer in excellent condition.
- **5 Excellent**. Probably the best you are ever likely to find. A seasoned drinker will award this score very rarely.

Log in to it using your normal CAMRA login details, search for the pub and then click on "Submit Beer Scores" - fill in the boxes on the form, scrolling down and then click "Submit Beer Score". You can do this for any pub in the country. Thanks!
