Champion Winter Beer of Britain 2012 was

chosen from the various category winners.

Overall Silver went to

Caimgorm brewery's Black Gold.

It had achieved the top, Gold, award in the Stouts category.

This well deserved accolade means that Black Gold will automatically be entered into the final for Champion Beer of Britain at the Great British Beer Festival, Olympia, London,

in Aug. (7th-11th).

In the **Barley Wines** category, **Isle of Skye's Cuillin Beast** won bronze.

Here in the Highlands, we know that both these

beers are well worth seeking out. Congratulations to both Cairngorm and

Full ale list, many of which were




The area winners this year are:

I would just like to respond to a comment made in your Winter 2011 Newsletter

On page 41 your writer Ian Simm makes the comment that when he visited the Bothy Bar in Fort Augustus

that the beer was cold (Cask Marque accreditation strikes again).

Cask Marque criteria for beer temperatures is that which the majority of brewers would like their beer to be drunk at (11-13 +/- 1 degree C). We visited the Bothy Bar on 7th Feb and the beer was being dispensed at a perfect 12.6 degrees. It is of course possible that the temperature changed between our visit and Mr Simm's visit. However, contrary to some people's views, Cask Marque do not encourage cold beer. If the beer is cold enough to get a chill haze then it will automatically fail our inspection.

We share very similar aims with CAMRA and that is to improve the quality of cask ale in the UK.

December Inverness Walkabout

I twas a cold, blustery, wet night as 14 L of us met at The Castle Tavern. 4 others met us as we toured the real ale outlets. A busy Castle Tavern offered Isle of Skye - Old Worthy (made with peat smoked barley which gives a slight whisky taste), Atlas Three Sisters, Cairngorm Wildcat, Caledonian Deuchars, Caledonian Flying Scotsman and Orkney Dark Island. All were in excellent condition and Dark Island was to become one or our beers of the night (BON). As usual we then split into groups, each with a list a real ale outlets to visit and wandered around meeting up as we went. Heathmount had a very good Houston Blonde Bombshell. Number 27 had OK Caledonian Deuchars and Green King Old Speckled Hen. The Caledonian had three Cairngorm brews and being a Tuesday had their special offer of £1.75 a pint making them the cheapest pint of the night. Santa's Sledgehammer and Tradewinds were OK but Nessies Monster Mash was just drinkable. Johnny Foxes had Black Isle Yellowhammer, which we have been told is on top pressure, but despite that, it was excellent (BON). The Waterfront had an excellent Cairngorm Blessed Thistle (BON).

Soon after this evening, The Waterfront suffered a kitchen fire which badly damaged their lounge area. They tried to keep the bar open but had to close while arranging for repairs. As of publishing, the building was still covered by waterproof canvases and not trading.

Hootananny had very good Black Isle -Heather Honey and Red Kite. Some did try the Black Isle craft Porter and thought it was far better than some similar keg ones. The Exchange has had its hand pump removed and there is still no real ale on the hand pump in Sammi's Bar. On to The Kings Highway where Belhaven - Howells - Frosty Bells, An Teallach Ale, Orkney - Andrews Ale and Houston - Barachan were all very good. Isle of Skye - Blaven was poor and taken off and Wooden Hands - Elves Bells was just drinkable. Green King - Abbot and Caledonian - Deuchars were also available but not tasted. The Innes Bar, recently started selling real ale after their refurbishment. A very busy pool evening greeted us in this very well set out place. A very good **Caledonian - Deuchars** was available and they usually have a second hand pump with another Caledonian brew on. The Phoenix had a just drinkable Hebridean - Berserker plus River Leven - Dark (brewing since September in the old Atlas brewery in Kinlochleven), Caledonian - Eildelwiess and Orkney -Corncrake which were all OK.

Sadly, the Pheonix has so far not been able to rise from the "ashes" it has lain in for the



A total of 34 pubs in our Branch area are listed in the guide. New for 2012:

Torridon Inn - Lying dose to the shore of Loch Torridon the inn enjoys spectacular views of the Torridon mountains. One ale from An Teallach is served in winter, with up to six in summer, including brews from the Isle of Skye and Cairngorm breweries. An excellent base for outdoor activity enthusiasts and families alike, the inn serves very good food from locally sourced ingredients. Traditional music is featured weekly in the summer and the inn runs a beer festival in September.

Congratulations to **Benleva Hotel** and **Cobbs at Nevisport** who both celebrate their tenth successive entry in the guide.

Long term successive entries, under the same ownership or stewardship, in the Highlands & Western Isles include the **Old Inn** at Gairloch (23), the **Grog & Gruel** in Fort William (16), the **Old Forge** at Inverie (16), and the **Stein Inn** (13) at Waternish on the Isle of Skye.

Blackfriars and **Clachnaharry Inn** are able to boast 17 consecutive entries, albeit under a number of owners or tenants. David Irvine at Clachnaharry and Dougie Fraser at Blackfriars placed these Inverness hostelries firmly on the Highlands real ale map in the nineties, and today Del & Janette Graham (Blackfriars) and Mark Kilby (Clachnaharry Inn) continue to serve real ales in the very best of condition.



Editor of "What's Yours Then?"

Q. Where are you originally from?

I'm from Dunfermline, the capital city of The Kingdom of Fife – that's where I was born and lived for a large part of my childhood.

Q. How did you end up in The Highlands?

Having to move a large distance was caused by the common reason – my father got a new job which meant moving to the far-east corner of Scotland – Fraserburgh. My job as a teacher was settled in Aberdeenshire until I changed for a place in a Highland school.

Q. How were you introduced to real ale?

As a student in Aberdeen in the late 70s, early 80s, it was natural to be exposed to a wide range of hand pulled ale. When I started drinking in bars, I was appalled at the horrible tasting fizzy stuff that was available. In Fraserburgh at my "local", we preferred to drink bottled Whitbread beer rather than anything on draught. Drinking in Aberdeen was a continuing revelation – the choice in The Prince of Wales alone was fabulous! I would seek a fork to drink Old Peculier!

Q. When and why did you join CAMRA?

During a holiday trip to London in 1995 with my then wife, it was the week of the GBBF. I knew of CAMRA having enjoyed several Aberdeen beer festivals in the 80s and we took the tube out to Olympia and spent a very pleasant few hours in the "biggest pub in the world" trying. It was fantastic and almost overwhelming. I joined CAMRA soon after that but only became an active member once I was single again!

Q. What do you look for in a pub?

I'm quite normal and boring in my preferences – a steady buzz of conversation, a gentle welcome and a choice of real ale available to try and enjoy. I'm quite happy for music to be on in the background but a pub is a place to meet with friends and catch up, chat and eventually set the world to rights, have a laugh and/or talk a load of s***e!

Q. What is your favourite beers/beer styles?

I have a particular weakness for a good, meaty porter. However, with the different categories of beer being so "moveable", some stouts and milds are equally partial to my tastes. I name my favourite beer as **Sarah Hughes' Ruby Mild** which I have only tried twice – both at beer festivals. The saying must be true – "Absence makes the heart grow fonder."!

Q. What hobbies/interests do you have?

Beginning when I was a student, along with most of my mates, for 20 years, I was a member of The Sealed Knot – the 20,000 strong, British-wide historical re-enactment group that demonstrates and educates on the 17th century civil wars - which started in Scotland. I am also a reasonable DIYer now improving my 3rd house.

Q. What is your favourite part of Scotland?

How do you choose a favourite part of Scotland where there are so many wonderful, beautiful parts to choose from? Edinburgh is a great city to visit with its many and varied attractions and its unique "feel" of a big city made up of many parts. Inverness is the best place to live in Scotland – it's big enough to have everything you need but has a small town feel and the greenery and mountains are within spitting distance.

Q. What is your favourite song/singer/group?

My favourite song for many years has been Robert Plant's "Big Log"- a unique, deep, bluesy rock song which makes little sense but sounds epic. My favourite group is Twisted Blues at Blackfriars – just my kind of music played live really well.

Q. Favourite film?

Bladerunner – an immense, multi-faceted, realistic take on a possible future. It will never be eclipsed! In my top 10 films are also Cars, The Incredibles, The Matrix, Some Like It Hot, Lawrence of Arabia, Zulu, Star Trek (2009), In The Heat of The Night and Brazil.

Q. Favourite book?

The Great McGonagall – the book of the film by the genius and spelling error, Spike Milligan.

Q. What plans do you have for the Newsletter? To carry on the high standard set over the past few years and create a professional looking, colourful, attractive but still informative "frontpage" for our Highlands & Western Isles branch which is a tall order since I have no creative imagination!





They are expanding and recruiting more staff for their new ventures one of which is creating new beers. An IPA project is planned, releasing 3 pairs of "IPA" beers with differing combinations of ingredients to compare and contrast. A double IPA is also planned in bottle form and more seasonal beers, many of which will be available at FyneFest. Black Isle Brewery are hoping to repeat their successful Summer Shindig again in early June which, last year saw about 1000 people enjoy a weekend of camping, music, a giant campfire,



food and of course, beer. Black Isle are also experimenting with new variations of their beers with new staff from the new, hugely expanded brewery. This includes some amazing one-off beers. Unfortunately, some of this experimenting involves producing craft beers i.e. nitro-kegged beer which takes it away from the interest of CAMRA.

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

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Highlands & Islands Brewers in 2012

Orkney Brewery - Brewing commenced in March 1988, at the old schoolhouse in Sandwick on Orkney Mainland.

Isle of Skye Brewery - Based at Uig, by the Western Isles ferry terminal, brewing since December 1995. Ales include Red & Black Cuillin, Young Pretender Hebridean Gold, and Blaven. Seasonal, House, and special event ales are brewed.

Valhalla Brewery - Most northerly brewery in the UK, brewing on Unst since December 1997. Ales include White Wife and Auld Rock.

Black Isle Brewery - Started brewing in December 1998 in converted farm buildings. Ales include Red Kite and Yellowhammer. Organic ales are a speciality.

Isle of Arran Brewery - Located close to Brodick Castle. Opened in late March 2000. Ales include Blonde, Dark, and Sunset.

Fyne Ales Brewery - Based in Argyll, at the head of Loch Fyne, brewing started on Andrew's Day 2001. Ales include Piper's Gold and Maverick.

Cairngorm Brewery Company - Set up in late 2001 to market the beers of the Tomintoul & Aviemore breweries, which they own. Ales include Trade Winds, Wildcat, Stag, Highland IPA, and Black Gold. Seasonal ales are regularly brewed.

Hebridean Brewing Company - Based at Stornoway in the Outer Hebrides. Brewing since January 2002. Beers include Islander Strong Ale, Berserker Export Pale Ale, and Clansman Ale (first ale ever brewed in Stornoway).

Atlas Brewery - Closed. Brewing moved to Orkney late in 2010.

An Teallach Brewery - Moved to the family's croft, near Dundonnell, in March 2003. Ales include An Teallach Ale, Beinn Dearg Ale, and Crofter's Pale Ale.

Islay Ales Co Ltd - Established in an old Tractor Shed in Bridgend, in March 2004. Ales include Finlaggan, Black Rock, and Dun Hogs Head; plus seasonal brews.

Cuillin Brewery - The brewery was born on 10^{th} September 2004, in the old public bar of the Sligachan Hotel. Skye, Eagle and Pinnacle Ales are brewed.

Highland Brewing Company - Located in the old Swannay cheese factory at Birsay, on Orkney Mainland. Ales include Scapa Special, Orkney Blast, Dark Munro.

Isle of Mull Brewery - From May 2005 in Tobermory. Sold plant to Oban Bay in 2009.

Sinclair Breweries Ltd - Formed in 2006 by local hotelier and restaurateur Norman

Sinclair, who purchased the Orkney and Atlas Breweries. Ales regularly brewed include Three Sisters, Latitude, and Nimbus from Atlas; plus Raven Ale, Dark Island, Red MacGregor, and Skull Splitter from Orkney.

Glenfinnan Brewery - Brewing on a 4 bbl plant since October 2006 - Regular brews are Glenfinnan Gold, The Standard Ale, and Glenfinnan Dark (for the Winter).

Colonsay Brewery - First brews in March 2007. IPA, 80/- and Lager (no real ales).

Plockton Brewery - The first brew was produced on 1st April 2007. Crags Ale and Starboard IPA may usually be found in Plockton, and at other local outlets.

Oban Bay Brewery - Brewing since mid 2009. 5 barrel brewery attached to Cuan Mor.

Old Inn (Gairloch) Brewery - 100 litre micro-brewery. First brews in February 2010.

Loch Ness Brewery - First brews in September 2011. RedNess, HoppyNess, Dark......

Cromarty Brewery - First brews in December 2011. Happy Chappy, Brewed Awakening.

Not all of the breweries listed are in our branch area: the Highland Brewing Co, Valhalla and Orkney are all in the Aberdeen, Grampian & Northern Isles area; the Arran Brewery falls in the Ayrshire & Galloway area; while Fyne, Islay, Mull, Colonsay & Oban Bay Breweries are covered by Glasgow & West Scotland. Similarly for Highlands & Islands pubs listed in the GBG, pubs in Orkney and Shetland are submitted by the Aberdeen, Grampian & Northern Isles Branch, and the Clachaig Inn somehow falls within the Glasgow & West Scotland branch area!







ONE FOR THE STAIRS

You may or may not have noticed that on the right hand side of the staircase that leads down to the "facilities" in the Castle Tavern, Inverness is a board showing local pub signs. *You'd have to be blind, Or blind drunk, to miss it! Ed*

One of those depicted, "The Bishops Table" particularly intrigued me and I made the decision, fatally as it proved, to ask a local at the bar if he knew where this establishment was or used to be situated. He did not, but with the determination of a Tam Dalziel he would not let this subject drop and roped in several innocent by-standers. It was not long before a fair sized crowd had gathered halfway down the stairs peering closely at "The Bishops Table" sign. This invariably led to glazed looks, muttering of the name and finally a shake of the head by all concerned. My main concern by this time was the backlog of people vainly trying to ascend from or descend to the aforementioned "facilities". Eventually I convinced everyone that "it didn't really matter", though the following week I was triumphantly informed that the Bishops Table was part of the Eden Court set up.

The matter did not quite end there as it was pointed out that the content on the board was hardly all embracing as it omitted places such as Gellions etc. For what it is worth, therefore, the following is a list of Inverness Taverns given in Slaters Scottish Directory 1860.

"Vintners" but these twenty establishments still form a good basis for any Christmas walkabout should a party of friends so wished. Of course there is no way of knowing if the above list is complete, is there?

Two brewers are also listed in the publication:

George Black, Thornbush Brewery John Buchanan, Haugh Brewery.

You could deduce from this that all the wares on offer were most certainly "real ales".

Perhaps they were given local "brand names " such as "Maggots Best" or perhaps a "Rainings" for the more educationally inclined, as in a series of letters written by Edmund Burt to a friend in London during the 1720s the ale is described as "Disagreeable in the extreme, with a tendency to give one a dose of the (how shall I put this?) "Tradewinds"".

The crafty locals apparently laced the beer with brandy or whisky.

In 1719 an act of Parliament gave Inverness Council the right to charge duty of 2 pence (Scots) on every pint of ale brewed and sold in the Burgh for a period of 19 years! The aim of this was to reduce the towns debts and undertake public works. In the first month £48 13s 8d was raised, representing a total of 5842 pints. Over the next twelve years £3,066 was collected reducing the debt to a mere £232 and work on a new harbour was able to go ahead.

You would have thought, with some justification, that the drinkers of Inverness deserved a well earned pat on the back for all of this, but no, in 1816 the Courier newspaper puts us all in our place:

"An alarm being spread that a gang of coiners and thieves were on their way from Aberdeen, the magistrates, by way of precaution desired all the publicans to be brought before them, licensed and unlicensed."

A total of 128 appeared although it was thought that another 32 had failed to do so.

The Courier continues:

"A number which, considering the population of Inverness, must have a very pernicious effect on the morals of the people"

Local directories to which I have access would yield up a list of local pubs for every decade between 1860 and 1970. It may be an undertaking worth doing, especially if it could be extended further afield in our area . You decide- I'm off to have "one for the stairs".

Cromarty are winning bar places on it's very *Locale* area of the Black Isle.

Black Isle beers are being seen around a bit more than of late.

Another rumour of a possible new brewery, this time in **Durness** has gone quiet and **Deeside** brewery have a new brewer and we expect to see their beers back in some of our pubs again. *They have also had a free advert* on STV news this evening (Wed 7th March)!

asting meeting

The last Tuesday of February was a tasty treat as 6 of us gathered in Black-friars for one of our tasting meet-

ings. These are focused on tasting the beer, filling in the official, CAMRA score cards for beer. We compare our individual scores and discuss the varied tastes that each beer divulges.

We started with 1/3 pints of **Beinn Dearg** which was in fine, hoppy form after An Teallach's "hibernation" as they overhauled and enhanced their kit. Scores varied but it averaged an overall 7 (out of 10). The new Orkney beer, **Orkney No. 1** was tried next and was warmly received. A full tasting beer that had caramel and hops building up nicely through the swallow and leaving a good bitter and hoppy aftertaste This 4.3% beer scored 8's all round. As well as some iced water we were treated by Del and Janette with baskets of small sausage rolls to refresh our palates between beers. Next up was Caimgorm's seasonal **Capercaillie**. Nicely hopped beer at 3.8% with complex tastes but slightly hazy despite being broached 3 days previously. It also had a slight underlying taste of green apples which can point to the beer not being fully conditioned at the brewery. It averaged a score of 5. Last but not least was Highland Brewery's **Orkney Blast**. Dangerously easy to drink at 6%, this beer gives a huge taste which lasts. Underlying sweetness and a fruity taste is accompanied by the warming effect of the alcohol and overall the beer scored an average of 8 giving it equal status with **Orkney No. 1** as our beer of the evening.

4 beers were plenty for any palate so it was then more chat and beer, but pints for those who wanted. Any CAMRA member can join in these tasting / social meetings so check the diary (page 6 or www.highlandcamra.org.uk) for our next one.

We are saddened to announce the passing away of John Aird in February, aged 88. Although born in Dumfries-shire, the call of the mountains and a job vacancy meant a move to Inverness in 1953. He was a very active person with hobbies of long distance walking, mountain climbing, cross

country skiing, orienteering, windsurfing, scuba diving and working on the Strathspey railway. Indeed on his 80th birthday he went snorkelling in Loch Carron! Most of these activities involved visiting a pub for another of his hobbies, drinking real ale. During his time up here, he was Commandant of The North Highland Army Cadet Force, a member of The Scottish Rights of Way Society and Governor of Eden Court Theatre. With all these activities, he still had time for his full time job, as a very respected Solicitor. He joined CAMRA in 1976 and when our Branch formed in 1993, he joined the Committee and was a very active member until into his 80's. His favourite beers were from the Isle of Skye and Cairngorm breweries, along with Harviestoun's Bitter and Twisted. He will always be remembered as an excellent raconteur with his ability to recall beers, breweries, places and dates in such detail. He was a true gentleman and time spent in his company was always very pleasurable.

Highlands & Western Isles CAMRA needs your help in surveying the pubs in our massive Branch area. To tell us which pubs are worth considering for the Good Beer Guide, use CAMRA's 6-point NBSS (National Beer Scoring Scheme) to record Beer Quality.

What do the scores mean?

0 - Undrinkable. No cask ale available or so poor you have to take it back or can't finish it.

1 - Poor. Beer that is anything from barely drinkable to drinkable with considerable resentment.

2 - Average. Competently kept, drinkable pint but doesn't inspire in any way, not worth moving to another pub but you drink the beer without really noticing.

3 - Good. Good beer in good form. You may cancel plans to move to the next pub. You want to stay for another pint and may seek out the beer again.

4 - Very Good. Excellent beer in excellent condition.

5 - Excellent. Probably the best you are ever likely to find. A seasoned drinker will award the score very rarely.

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



