The Chairman's map-reading, aided by little pink arrows on the way-markers, brought the party back to the comforts of the Heatherbrae in time to enjoy a wonderful spread of soup and sandwiches, provided by our hosts Jan and Maureen. The food was washed down with pints of Cairngorm's White Lady and the championship winning brew, Trade Winds. The group was very appreciative of the great country pub atmosphere that Jan and Maureen have created in this Speyside village. Every village should have one.

Why are so many of them closing down?? Join CAMRA today and help to prevent these closures!!

On to the **Cairngorm Brewery**, and more excellent examples of the brews being crafted by this brewery. Knowing what

we had been drinking previously, Merlin and Sean provided the occasional brew Cairngorm IPA, and the prize winning Black Gold, for tasting. As you would expect, both were in top class condition and worthy of the growing reputation of this expanding brewery. Sean gave us an

update on brewery developments, while giving us a most interesting and informative tour of the brewing area. Thanks are due also for their parting gift of a four pack each of their excellent products.

Onward to the **Winking Owl** in Aviemore; once a mecca for real ale in this area but sadly now out of the guide for a number of years. Disappointingly, only two out of four handpumps were operating, offering Cairngorm Wild Cat and Trade Winds, but both were in acceptable condition.

The Cairngorm Hotel was the next to be visited where owner Peter Steinle is happy to provide Cairngorm Stag on the single handpump. It was in excellent form as usual and nobody moaned about the 'lack of choice'. At least it is always on, in this writers experience anyway. (Why do so many pubs find it so difficult to keep a single handpump running?)

At the Old Bridge Inn we had an opportunity to sample brews from south of the border. The Jennings Cumberland Ale was a bit on the 'pipey' side, but the Young's Bitter went down very well, as did the Caley 80/-. The many changes to this establishment - new bunkhouse and a refurbished restaurant - have not affected the cosy feel of the bar.

We finished the day at the **Glen Hotel** in Newtonmore, where we enjoyed the fine hospitality of hosts Chris and Kim. The four handpumps provided a good choice of Glen Bogle (their Isle of Skye House Ale), Adnams Broadside, and Atlas Latitude. All ales were in excellent condition. The newly refurbished bar is now more roomy but still has the atmosphere of a comfy

#### The Remotest Pint in Britain?

At long last an opportunity to visit the Old Forge, advertised as 'the remotest pub in Britain'. My pal Sandy needed a hand to polish off a few Munros in this

wilderness area, and I jumped at the chance. It takes some effort to get to the Old Forge, having to catch a not very frequent ferry, and after a long but spectacular for-

ty mile drive west from Fort William.

Despite being in the Good Beer Guide for a number of years, I still felt apprehensive. Could the beer really be kept well; would I be getting the all too familiar 'Oh we are just waiting for the next delivery' or 'it's just gone off' as is often the case in pubs a little off the beaten track.

I should not have felt so cynical. The pub turned out to be everything you would expect of a GBG entry, including friendly landlord, Ian Robertson, and a wonderful atmosphere. There were always two real ales on; one from Skye and one from south of the border, and when one ran out another replaced it straight away. It would most certainly be worth the trip to the pub alone, even if there was not the

added attraction of spectacular scenery and some of the remotest mountains in Scotland just outside the front door.

I visited it in the early evening of each of the four days we were there and it was never less than busy; not

crowded but doing a very healthy business - promising to be even busier later on when the music started. You certainly did not get the feel of remoteness inside this pub. I reckon there are a few pubs in Inverness with less trade on a Friday paynight.

Yes, the Old Forge at Inverie is well worth the effort it

takes you to get there. Thank you to Ian and please keep up the good work. You have a little gem and long may it stay so.

Mark and Lucy, the new tenants, had been invited to the party and were introduced as they joined in the celebrations. We all wish them every success now that they have taken on the lease of this popular Inverness real ale pub. They have a tough act to follow after Dougie and Zander, the two previous landlords, lifted the pub's profile from just another town centre pub to one of the most respected and popular real ale outlets in Inverness.

Mark Bracken and his partner Lucy Slater do not lack in experience with real ale.

Lucy has been an assistant manager in a

Fullers pub in London and Mark has worked in both Youngs and Greenall pubs.

There has been little noticeable change in the way the pub is run during the two months they have been in charge, and their intention is to keep things pretty much the same, including the food and the musical evenings. They also aim to

keep all nine of the handpumps busy at weekends, with at least six dispensing during the week. As for the choice of beer, Mark says: "We intend to obtain most of our independent beers from the Cairngorm and Isle of Skye Breweries, but we are happy to listen to requests from our customers for their favourite ales from these or other breweries".

The days when Inverness was a real ale desert are now long gone, and we all hope that Mark and Lucy (pictured below) can maintain the high standards that have



been set in this particular outlet.

#### West Coast Trails

Sunday 13<sup>th</sup> June, and time for another brewery trip, our first on a Sunday. Rendez-vous as usual at Inverness Town House, and the group of fourteen climbed into the waiting transport - this time provided and driven by Charlie Fraser of Munlochy. A short drive only across country to our first stop. The Inchbea Lodge Hotel, just past Garve on the

A835, is a former Victorian Huntina Lodge on the banks of the Black Water river. The public rooms are snug and cosy, with comfortable beamed alcove seating areas, a coffee bar, dining room and a small bar area There was one handpump, serving Isle of Skye Black

Cuillin, and which was very good. They rotate Skye beers and are getting well known in the area for real ale. Skye bottled beer packs are very popular with visitors. We could easily have stayed for longer, but we had a schedule to meet.

An Teallach Brewery owner Davie Orr was waiting to greet us at the impressive Dundonnell Hotel, which sits on the edge of Little Loch Broom in the shadow of the mighty An Teallach. New owners have refurbished the hotel and introduced real ale, which is becoming very popular. The cask of An Teallach was set up under the

bar but, unfortunately for us, someone had disturbed it and it had gone cloudy. This was a great pity as we had received a report, only a week earlier, that An Teallach ale was being served, and that it was in first class condition. We settled instead for some soup and a roll before accompanying Davie to the brewery, which is only a short distance away and is set in a wonderful loch-side location.

The An Teallach Brewery is a husband and wife business, Wilma does the brewing (along with Pam Jones on Skye, that makes Wilma one of only two female head brewers in Scotland), and Davie takes care of deliveries. The brewery has been set up in the family croft at Camusnagaul. They started, three years ago, by having their beers brewed at The Atlas Brewery until such time as they had built their own brewery in their garden. There are three regular brews, An Teallach Ale (4.2%), Beinn Dearg (3.8%), and Crofters Pale Ale

(4.2%). Davie and Wilma have no plans

for any major expansion as they are happy with the business as it is. They are brewing to capacity at this time of year and de-

livering as far as Edinburgh. In the quieter winter months they bottle condition some of their brews for the local market.

Davie gave us a few samples of his brews along with an interesting and jovial talk through the brewing process. It was very good to see two enthusiastic people enjoying their work and showing us around. An Teallach is now an awardwinning brewery following being voted Beer-of-the-Festival at Walsall recently.

Ever onward, and after thanking Davie and Wilma for their hospitality we headed further west, to the Old Inn at Gairloch. Owner Alastair Pearson was on hand to welcome us in person, and he was keen to show us around follow-

ing the recent refurbishment. The Old Inn is a traditional coaching inn, set in a stunning riverside location at the foot of the Flowerdale Glen, close to Gairloch harbour In the bar there was an excellent range of real ales on tap - Atlas Latitude, An Teallach Ale, Isle of Skye Red Cuillin and Black Cuillin, Orkney Dark Island, Cairngorm Stag, Caledonian Deuchars IPA and Black Sheep Bitter - and all were in very good condition. We held a Branch meeting here, hoping that some of the large contingent of local CAMRA members would attend, but only Alastair did. After the meeting it was time to sample the wonderful food on offer and quite a few took the opportunity to sample the local seafood dishes in which the Old Inn specialises.

Bill Tring, the Branch Chairman, then presented Alastair with the Country Pub-of-the-Year Certificate and wished him good luck in the Scottish Pub of the Year competition. (See below).

More thanks and another reluctant departure (almost on time), but it did at

least mean that we were able to make a midway stop at the Kinlochewe Hotel. This large hotel, with adjoining bunkhouse, has a small bar with two large drinking rooms and separate dining room. Isle of Skye beers are sold in rotation and a very good Black Cuillin was on tap. Unlike


many one handpump establishments, the next beer was settling and all but ready to go on. The landlord remarked that Real Ale is getting very popular now and that Isle of Skye Hebridean Gold is a favourite with the locals. Our driver enjoyed a very good meal as we supped a last pint. A very contented bunch of travellers boarded the bus for the final leg of the journey homeward. A very good day, and enjoyed by all.

The Old Inn at Gairloch will be pitted against the Redgarth Hotel, Old Meldrum (Aberdeen, Grampian & the Northern Isles winner), and the Ericht Ale House, Blairgowrie (Tayside) in the North area section. The Scotland & NI Pub-of-the-Year will be selected from the regional winners.

Inverness & Highland CAMRA Country Pub-of-the-Year for 2004

Pam Jones is not only the head brewer at the Isle of Skye brewery, but also one of only two female head brewers in Scotland. We asked her a few questions.

Q: What made you move to Skye? A: My mother and father had bought a house on Skye, here in Uig, and said they would like me to move here with my daughter Samantha.

Q: How long have you lived on Skye?

A: I have been here for 10 years now. My older brother John now also works here. running a recycling wood business.

Q: How did you become a brewer? A: I started from scratch in the brew house, graduatina from washing casks to cleaning tanks, and then to transferring from the fermenting vessels to the conditioning vessels. Next it was delivering and

getting to know our customers, and then to filtering for our bottling. I was and still am responsible for the cleanliness in the brewery. All the time I was working I was watching all the procedures and then started to help out with the brewing. I started brewing 5 years ago.

Q: Where are you originally from? A: I came from Bolton. A fully trained chef and confectioner.

Q: What was your first brew? A: A ten barrel brew of Red Cuillin, an award winner.

Q: Describe a typical brewing day. A: lot of planning and cleaning takes place before any brew. The grain is mixed the night before to save time. Once I am satisfied that the mash tun and copper are ready I will start. The water must be

at the correct temperature to give the mash an overall reading of 65C. It takes 25 minutes to mash.

Once all the grain goes in you start cleaning the next set of pipework, copper and fermenting vessel. Once the mash is ready you transfer it into the copper, sparging the grain so that the remaining water is used. Once in the copper the heaters go on. Then hops are added. Once this process is finished

the liquid goes through a heat exchanger which takes

about 45 minutes taking the temperature down to 19C. Then on into the fermenting vessel where you calculate the Original Gravity and adjust it to the right OG by adding sparge from the hops.

We add a few litres of the wort to the yeast to get this activated so we can add this at the end. Once ready we paddle/ circulate the beer.

Q: What are your favourite beers/beer type/other brewery beers?



A: My favourite of our beers is The Cuillin Beast at 7% ABV. I came up with this recipe due to us

reaching gyle 666. I wanted a strong beer (a beast). This has since won the beer of the festival at The Benleva Hotel in Drumnadrochit, and at CAMRA events in Southampton, plus Beer-of-the-Festival for the last two years at Aberdeen. We export this in bottles to, amongst other places, The United States of America and Denmark. I also like the Inveralmond and Timothy Taylor beers.

Q: Which part of your job do you like most of all?

A: Producing quality beers and having long term customers who have taken the beer from day one and who I regard as not just customers, but friends. Having people visit us and sharing with us what they think of our beers. Knowing there is such a demand and that we all can produce the beers at their best. It is not

just me; I have a really great team in the brew house who I can rely on.

Q: Do you like living on Skye? A: Yes I do, the lifestyle, the wildlife, everything apart from the midges.



#### **Expansion Latest**

Isle of Skye Brewery has just finished the latest phase and are back into full production. There is a new mash tun, a 22 barrel copper copper, 2 insulated cooling tanks, a 20 barrel fermenting tank, a new tank cleaning system, an improved cask washer, and an oil-fired condensing boiler. Fermenting capacity has gone up from 40 to 60 barrels and conditioning from 60 to 100 barrels at a time.



#### The Good Beer Guide

The best place to find good pubs and good beer. The Good Beer Guide is more than just a pub auide. Britain's longest-running and best-selling guide contains Britain's best pubs for real ale. But for beer lovers it also gives up-to-date information on the country's beers and breweries. It is compiled by 70,000 dedicated volunteers in the Campaign for Real Ale. There are no fees for listings, and every pub is checked many times a vear.

The unique Breweries section lists all breweries micro, regional and national - that produce cask beer, with tasting notes compiled by CAMRAtrained tasting teams. There's also information about beers suitable for vegetarians and vegans, as well as the growing number of organic beers. The Guide lists new breweries, closed breweries. mergers and takeovers, and keeps track of the new, powerful pub groups.

Orkney Brewery - Brewing commenced in Isle of Arran Brewery - Located close March 1988 at the old schoolhouse in Sandwick. Ales include Dark Island and Red MacGregor.

An Teallach Brewery - A beer was brewed for this company at the Atlas Brewery from May 2002. Moved to Dundonnell during March 2003.

Islay Ales Co Ltd - Started brewing in March 2004. "Finlaggan" and "Blackrock". Little information currently available.



#### News of Brews

Following pressure from customers, the **Isle of Skye Brewery** has recently produced two new, limited edition, bottled beers -

St Michael's Steeple Ale (4.6%) has been produced mainly for St Michael's and All Angels Church in Inverness as a fund-raiser (available from canon Len Black, and from the brewery shop).

Glen-Bogle (4.1%) is a special for the Glen in Newtonmore (available from the Glen and from the brewery shop).

Both beers are/were the cask versions. Until now the brewery has steered clear of bottling blends but, as these have turned out well, more may follow.

A new seasonal passenger ferry service started recently between Gairloch and Portree. 6° West, the ferry operators, note on their web site that "beverages with a strong local accent are available on board". The beverages include a bottled Isle of Skye Brewery ale - 6° West! (6° West is the line of longitude crossed four times daily by the ferry).

#### Atlas/Orkney Latest

The new Highlands and Islands Breweries company has nearly sorted out all the legal paperwork in the joining of Atlas and Orkney breweries. It is stressed that the Orkney beers will still be brewed on the island, with Atlas beers being brewed at Kinlochleven, keeping their distinctive brands and tastes. Manning levels will also not be affected although one additional person is being employed at the moment.

The main difference is on the distribution side, with a new depot being built at Dalkeith, combining with the existing distribution through the Orkney and Atlas van routes, which are supplemented by the Beer Seller and Ardo Ales, etc. The Atlas van now has a twice weekly delivery to Edinburgh and Inverness.

Orkney already have their beers bottled by Belhaven and Atlas are still looking at bottling theirs.

Local breweries featured prominently in the SIBA National Beer Competitions. Black Isle Brewery took two second prizes in the Belgian Style Wheat Beer category for their Hibernator and Wheat brews. Cairngorm Brewery's White Lady won first prize in the Bavarian Style Wheat Beer. Black Isle also won a third prize for their Yellowhammer Organic Beer. Atlas featured in the Strong Ale category, Nimbus taking second place. Results in full at www.siba.co.uk.

SIBA, Society of Independent Brewers, aims "To campaign on behalf of craft brewers to ensure that they have the best possible opportunity to bring their goods to the market."

Heather Ale has outgrown its current base, a picturesque 18th-century watermill at Strathaven, Lanarkshire, and has bought the Forth Brewery in Alloa for a six-figure sum. At the same time the name has changed to Williams Brothers.

Why the interesting new name? Ed.








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
