

Bill heads up the local tasting panel, as well as carrying out local Brewery Liaison Officer (BLO) duties. Eric and John also have BLO commitments and Eric, as the branch Social Secretary, organises trips and outings. Mike is the Membership Secretary as well as Treasurer.

So what does the Branch do?

With 80 members, we are a relatively small branch and members are spread across a massive area. It is difficult to arrange trips to suit all. Suggestions for outings and events are always welcome.

We organise a real ale bar at the annual Marymas Fair, we promote local pubs through Pub-of-the-Year (see pages 8/9) and Good Beer Guide nominations, and we make regular visits to local breweries. We represent our pubs and brewers at national CAMRA forums, and we submit tasting notes and brewery information for inclusion in the Good Beer Guide.

A Stormy Day on the Cuillin

A small but dedicated bunch of travellers braved the wind and rain to rendez-vous at the Town House early one Saturday morning in September. All aboard Kenny's minibus, fares collected, and then it was full speed along the Loch Ness road.

The weather had been poor on last year's Skye trip, but cleared to give stunning views of mountain ridges as we descended into Glen Shiel. No such luck this year and it was a relief to find that the Skye Bridge crossing was into the teeth of a gale rather than with a nasty crosswind.

A left turn just before Broadford, and then south on the new road to Sleat and the first stop of the day at Hotel Eilean Iarmain (Isle Ornsay Hotel). A quick pint of Isle of Skye Blaven, a few minutes to admire the beautiful Sound of Sleat, and then onward to the north end of Skye.

Leaving the main road at the Fairy Bridge and after a few miles of single track, we drop down to the Stein Inn at Lochbay. Bitter & Twisted, Stag, and an un-named handpump which held the Skye Brewery's new Oyster Stout. Snack time for some meant a second Oyster Stout for others.

Skye Brewery at Uig. In keeping with local custom, a Leann Failte house brew had been prepared for the day. A Skye beer gift pack was the reward for guessing the correct mix of beers but, with no ABV clue, it was not easy to guess which beer had been blended with the easily identified Black Cuillin. The one-to-one blend with Blaven was missed by most!

A very tasty buffet was devoured in the brewery sun lounge, and washed down with more Leann Failte (Welcome Ale), plus a sample - from the wood - of the new Oyster Stout. Very tasty!

And more Skye beer gift packs for those who could still throw a bung into or at a barrel with some degree of accuracy..

All good things come to an end and, after quick visits to the brewery shop and Inn on the Pier (Red Cuillin in good nick), it was time to start the long journey home. Angus and Pam's brother John joined us for some very drinkable Red Cuillin in the Uig Hotel, and for MacNab's and Red Cuillin in Portree Hotels Royal and Isles, before heading homeward once more.

The Claymore Restaurant in Broadford and Glenmoriston Arms Hotel completed a long but very enjoyable day out for all.

2004 is the Year of Beer with Food and CAMRA have suggested a few Beer and Food matches that are worth a try..

> The 2003 Champion Beer of Britain, Harviestoun Bitter & Twisted from Dollar, Clackmannanshire is a golden beer brewed with wheat as well as barley malt and with a deep hop bitterness that marries well with the traditional spicy dish of Haggis/Vegetarian Haggis, Potato and Turnip Fritters with Onion Gravy -

225 gms Haggis, 225 gms potato, 225 gms turnip, 225 gms onions, 150 mls Bitter & Twisted, 450 mls stock, plain flour, 1 egg beaten with a little milk, seasoning, breadcrumbs, parsley to garnish. Serve with a mustard mash. (and presumably washed downed with more Bitter & Twisted).

> Port Stout with Stilton. The 2003
Champion Bottle-conditioned beer,
O'Hanlon's Port Stout, is the ideal companion for powerful, tangy blue cheese.
O'Hanlon's Port Stout, brewed by John
O'Hanlon in Whimple, Devon, is a dark,
roasty, bitter beer with the addition of
port wine. In Dublin, barmen call this
beer "a corpse reviver" and serve it as a
hangover cure.



The Good Beer Guide

The best place to find good pubs and good beer. The Good Beer Guide is more than just a pub guide. Britain's longest-running and best-selling guide contains Britain's best pubs for real ale. But for beer lovers it also gives up-to-date information on the country's beers and breweries. It is compiled by 69,000 dedicated volunteers in the Campaign for Real Ale. There are no fees for listings, and every pub is checked many times a year.

The unique Breweries section that lists all breweries - micro, regional and national - that produce cask beer, with tasting notes compiled by CAMRA-trained tasting teams. There's also information about beers suitable for vegetarians and vegans, as well as the growing number of organic beers. The Guide lists new breweries, closed breweries, mergers and takeovers, and keeps track of the new, powerful pub groups.

Congratulations to the new owners at Benleva Hotel in Drumnadrochit on winning the Country Pub vote in only their second year of trading.

James Beaton, with brothers Allan and Stephen Crossland, purchased Benleva in November 2001. The new owners spent much of the first winter constructing a new bar and renovating the kitchen. Benleva is open all day all year for both food and drink, and the increasing sales of real ale mean that, since June, there are regularly three beers available on handpump.

Meanwhile regulars over at the Clachnaharry Inn will be familiar with the steady progress over the years as Davie renovated and made improvements to the inn, and built a thriving business around fine ales, good value bar meals, and a friendly welcome to all.

Having at last "received an offer I couldn't refuse", Davie is finally catching up with his garden, plus some hill-walking and fishing, while new landlord George MacLean settles in at Clachnaharry Inn.

There are some new faces behind the bar who, along with Veronica and Mark 1, are helping George to maintain the Inn's much deserved reputation for good quality food and ales. George has expressed a desire to expand the selection of guest ales, and there is even talk of a beer festival!

A difficult choice, but after much debate Benleva was selected to represent the branch area in the annual Scottish Pub of the Year, ultimately finishing third behind Geordie's Byre in Ayr, and the Wheatsheaf in Falkirk.



John has been a committee member since the Inverness & Highland Branch first came into being as an offshoot of the Aberdeen Branch back in 1993. John now feels he needs to ease off just a little bit and allow younger members to take over. His views and opinions, and his vast knowledge of real ales past and present, have been much valued at our meetings and will be missed.

John is a renowned raconteur and all who have spent time in his company will have enjoyed listening to his seemingly inexhaustible tales of hill walking, diving,



climbing, railway building, military escapades, and other pursuits too many to mention. His phenomenal memory, and his ability to recall the exact date, time and place of so many of his experiences, continues to amaze.

A retired lawyer, John is a well-known city worthy and is recognised by many in the Inverness area. His many active interests include the Strathspey Steam Railway, the Scottish Rights of way Society, the theatre (he is a governor of Eden Court Theatre), and until recently deep-sea diving.

His long association with Eden Court has been instrumental in the organisation of our regular real ale stall at the annual Marymas Festival.

On behalf of all branch members the committee wish John continuing good health and many more happy years here in Inverness. We hope the local Branch will continue to benefit from his interest and experience in the CAMRA real ale scene.

And a few more stories at (and of) the bar, of course!

Marymas Fair

After selling out by early afternoon in 2002, we decided to sell four ales at our Real Ale bar in 2003. An innovative ale colours theme meant that we wanted a selection of red, gold, dark, and pale ales. Following our usual objectives of supporting local brewers, and of exposing the public to ales not regularly available in Inverness pubs, we eventually decided upon Atlas Lattitude, Black Isle Yellowhammer, Skye Black Cuillin, and Cairngorm Wild Cat. As if by magic, this selection also provided ales of a strength to suit all

- 3.6, 4.0, 4.5, and 5.0 per cent ABV respectively.

A mid-afternoon sell-out indicated another good choice of ales.



Highlands & Islands Brewers in 2003

Orkney Brewery - Brewing commenced in March 1988 at the old schoolhouse in Sandwick. Ales include Dark Island and Red MacGregor.

Isle of Skye Brewery - Based at Uig by the Western Isles ferry terminal. Brewing since December 1995. Ales include Red & Black Cuillin and Blaven. House, seasonal, and special event ales are brewed.

Valhalla Brewery - The most northerly brewery in the UK started brewing on the island of Unst in December 1997. Ales include White Wife.

Black Isle Brewery - Started brewing in December 1998 in converted farm buildings. Ales include Red Kite and Yellowhammer. Organic ales a speciality.

Isle of Arran Brewery - Located close to Brodick Castle. Opened late March 2000. Ales include Blond and Dark.

Newtonmore & Kingussie Brewery - Started brewing in October 2001, using the location and plant previously used by Iris Rose.

Fyne Ales Brewery - Based at the head of Loch Fyne, brewing started on St Andrew's Day 2001. Ales include Piper's Gold and Maverick.

Cairngorm Brewery Company - Set up in late 2001 to market the beers of Tomintoul and Aviemore breweries which they own. Ales include Wildcat, Stag, Highland IPA.

Hebridean Brewing Company - Based in Stornoway on the Isle of Lewis. First beer was produced at the end of January 2002.

Atlas Brewery - Brewing in one of the old Aluminium Smelter buildings at Kinlochleven since February 2002. Ales include Latitude and Wayfarer.

An Teallach Brewery - A beer was brewed for this company at the Atlas Brewery from May 2002. Moved to Dundonnell during March 2003.

A continuing success story for real ale in the Highlands and Islands.

Not all of the breweries listed are in our branch area - Valhalla and Orkney are in the Aberdeen, Grampian & Northern Isles area; the Arran Brewery falls within the Ayrshire & Galloway area; while Fyne Ales is covered by Glasgow & West Scotland.

With all this fine ale being brewed there just has to be somewhere nearby where you can sample a pint or two of the stuff. In support of local publicans and brewers we regularly monitor real ale outlets in our area so that there is an accurate selection of Highland & Island entries in the Good Beer Guide.

Turn over for the history of Good Beer Guide entries in our locality.

Highlands & Islands Good Beer Guide Entries (1985, 1990/91, 1993-2004)

There was not a single pub listed for the Highlands & Islands in the 1997 Good Beer Guide. With the exception of a relatively short journey to the Red Lion at Forres, or

to the Palace in Perth, it seems that a major expedition to the early real ale meccas of Strathclyde or Lothian was necessary to find any significant choice of real ale.

Some pubs have been and gone, some to return in later years, and a few pubs have made irregular or fleeting appearances in the guide. The usual suspects have been around since early days, and it is refreshing to see that, despite the closure of pubs throughout the land, the number of hostelries serving real ale in the Highlands & Islands is on the increase - not to mention the number of brewers.

Cairngorm Black Gold and Atlas Three Sisters completed a monopoly of podium places for our local Highlands & Islands brewers.

The second Loch Ness Beer Festival, hosted by Inverness & Highland Country-Pub-of-the-Year Benleva Hotel, was a great success. We're told that the vote for Beer of the Festival ended in a fourway tie, and the organisers are hoping that an uncounted and deciding vote may turn up during Spring cleaning!

Cairngorm Trade Winds voted 'Beer of the Festival' by the public at the Mains Hotel Beer Festival in Newtonmore.

Inns 'n' Things

Real ale is back on tap at the Winking Owl in Aviemore. The Royal at Kingussie has changed hands, the bar may not be open.

The Royal Hotel at Fortrose is now selling real ale, and new owner Jim Anderson is advertising "Multicultural Food, Proper Cask Ales, Impressive Malts, Belgian Beer Heaven, and a Nice Place to Stay".

In May 2003 Angus & Teresa celebrated 10 years at the Stein Inn on Skye. The inn had been closed for 18 months when

they bought it, and was in a poor state. The inn has been renovated, extended, modernised, and refurbished; and yet none of the character and charm of this wonderful old loch-side inn has been lost.

The Old Inn at Gairloch will be closed for six weeks from 5th January 2004, for refurbishment.

Newsletter Archives

February 2000 - Issue No. 3 of the Branch Newsletter carried an article on Blackfriars titled *End of an Era*. The era in question was the nine years during which Dougie Fraser managed Blackfriars on behalf of S&N. During this time the Blackfriars was a mecca for the choice and quality of real ales.

The decision by S&N to move the pub from their managed estate to the tenancy side of their business sadly led to Dougie's departure to pastures new. With no news of when a leaseholder or tenant might be in place, and following a decline of beer quality while the pub was run by a succession of temporary managers, the committee had no option but to withdraw Blackfriars from the Good Beer Guide.

By the time Issue No. 4 was published in August of that year, Alexander (Zander) MacDiarmid had taken over and we were able to report that "the quality of ales is once again excellent and members will be pleased to know that the Blackfriars will take its rightful place back in GBG 2001".
