Brewery: The front page



of our Summer newsletter carried a collage of Highlands & Islands brewery logos and we somehow managed to omit a reference to this award-winning brewery!

The Cairngorm Brewery has been trading since 2001 and is based in Aviemore within the boundary of Cairngorm National Park.

The brewery has a 10 barrel mash tun and copper, 90 barrels of fermentation capacity and 100 barrels of conditioning capacity. All malts are milled on site and whole hop flowers are used; both aid in ensuring that consistent high quality is maintained. The majority of the beers are racked and leave the site in cask format.

The brewery has 14 different brews; some brewed all year round, others as seasonal brews. Six of the brews are also bottled. See press release on page 32

Brewer Wilma Orr has told us that there is no foundation for the comments about the Brewhouse Special (page 20, Summer edition) being a 'mistake Brew'.

We are delighted to have been inundated with letters, e-mails, on-line Rate-our-Beer reports, and beer report cards. 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A Branch Outing to the Far North

Eight Branch members and two guests would not have believed, as they set off in early June on a trip to the real ale outlets of the North East Highlands, that one of the highlights of the day would be a visit to a family grocer in Thurso.

Our transport was again provided by Charlie Fraser of Munlochy, and driver Gordon picked us up promptly from the Town House. We left Inverness and headed northeast, picking up three of our party at the Nigg roundabout before turning inland at Bonar Bridge. Unfortunately the Loch Shin Hotel was closed and so we could not try the Skye beer available there. Evidently most of the trade is now from the local Youth Hostel and they are doing other things at midday on Saturday! Some were pleased to leave the rather desolate parts of Sutherland behind them and enjoy the refreshment on offer at the Tongue Hotel (the first find of the day: it not being noted in our list of real ale outlets). The Deuchar's IPA was a little on the cold side but nevertheless very welcome. Along the coast to the east next for the main item on the agenda, a visit to Peter Martin's Far North Brewery at the Melvich Hotel. Here we were very well entertained by Peter, with scampi and chips which were washed down by quite a few pints of Split Stone Bitter (4.2%) and Fast Reactor (4.8%); perhaps just as well that the Edge of Darkness at 6.5% was not available. Refreshments were followed by a very instructive visit to the small brewing plant.

Next stop was in Thurso where the smoky atmosphere of the GBG-listed Central Hotel proved too much for most of the party, although the few who braved the unhealthy atmosphere reported that John Smiths Magnet Pale Ale, Deuchar's IPA and Palmers of Dorset were all in fine condition. The atmosphere in the Commercial Hotel was much better though, unfortunately, the Young's Waggle Dance was not; resulting in a number of half empty glasses being left on the bar.

A visit to JA Mackay's family owned and run Licensed Grocers, opposite the Central Hotel in Thurso, had been recommended. We had been told that Andy Costello keeps a good selection of bottled beers. What an understatement! There must have been about ten metres of shelf space given over to bottled beers, and each single file held a different variety. The lucky beer drinkers of Thurso should be proud that they can merit such a selection in this small town. This writer has not seen such a choice anywhere else, including in the supermarkets of Inverness. A must for any real ale visitor to north Caithness. Andy generously offered a few tastings, and also passed around a fine 12 year old Highland Park malt to sample. All were agreed that Andy's was the best family grocer's shop anyone had visited in a long time. Naturally a number of the party came away with a few carry-outs, but I do not think any were tempted to buy the £800 plus single malt whisky on display.

South to Wick, and to the newish Wetherspoons outlet, the Alexander Bain, where we were surprised to be greeted by Garry, an ex-manager of both the Phoenix and Findlay's in Inverness. Possibly the best pub atmosphere of the day in this light, and



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airy, and typical JD Wetherspoon pub where a young lady's birthday party added to the convivial atmosphere. The beers on tap included the usual Deuchar's IPA and McEwan's 80/-, plus Cairngorm Wild Cat; all in good condition. Where can one obtain the large range of beers so proudly described in the Wetherspoon's literature? At Mackay's Hotel the Old Peculier was given a "thumbs up" by most of the party.

We enjoyed our final pints of cold but tasty Deuchar's IPA at the Castle Hotel in Dornoch, before Gordon deposited us at our various dropping points.

A most enjoyable trip, though the beers available were dominated rather by the '&' Brewery. The important thing was to find that there were so many available outlets in what was once a complete desert on the Highlands & Islands real ale map.

Thanks to all the licensees, the brewers, the grocers, the driver, and all who turned up for making the day and our first trip to the "Far North" such an enjoyable one.

The Far North sounds like another candidate for a regular trip.. Ed

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Marymas Festival Real Ale Bar

After so any good weather days for this popular event, 2005 brought the weather we had all dreaded. After a dry morning the forecasters were proved correct when it poured down all afternoon. All the more disappointing as we had tapped an extra (fifth) cask following the early afternoon sell-outs on the warm and sunny festival days of the last couple of years.



All five ales sold well, but once again

the stout drinkers ensured an early end to the full-bodied 4.4% ABV Cairngorm Black Gold. The fruity light straw coloured 3.6% ABV Atlas Latitude, and distinctive 4.3% ABV Isle of Skye Hebridean Gold, plus the stronger ales, a deep ruby 4.8% ABV Hebridean Islander Strong Ale, and the golden orange 5% ABV Isle of Skye Blaven, completed the varied choice of beers for drinkers.

The heavy downpour brought a premature end to proceedings and meant that, even after filling a number of 2 pint carry-outs, we still had to pour away some gallons of these wonderful brews. Early calculations indicate that we have probably managed

to make a small profit, and for this we must thank all our regular and loyal supporters who did not let the wet conditions spoil their real ale day. The shelter of our gazebo helped, as did the three umbrellas provided for drinkers closer to the bar. The feeling is that the decision by the committee to go for five casks this year has certainly paid off. Okay, it can be argued that if we had only had four casks we would have made a good profit. King profit does not necessarily rule though, as our annual presence at Marymas is to introduce the people of Inverness to real ale and provide it at its best for the seasoned real ale drinker. Far better, we think, to provide a good selection of beers at different strengths and flavours than to worry too much about selling every last pint. Let's face it, had it not rained the beer would have run out by early afternoon as usual, and committee would be dis-

DRINK YOURSELF BLIND (TASTING)

On Saturday 15 October at 3:00pm, The Anderson in Fortrose will host a blind tasting of ciders made from apples grown by Ryefield Farms of Tore. This will be the first time Ryefield's ciders will have been tasted side-by-side. Apples are a new crop for Ryefield Farm, which is just a few miles away from Fortrose on the idyllic Black Isle. They are best known for their strawberries and raspberries, which draw fruit-lovers from the four corners of the Highlands. But recently owner Torquil Fraser began to grow apples with cider-making in mind.

The ciders are made from different combinations of Howgate Wonder, Bramley and Discovery, varieties not normally associated with cidermaking. "This is a long-term project," says Fraser, who makes the cider himself. "A real cider made from local apples is something nobody's doing in the Highlands."

"Since replacing Strongbow with Addlestone's cask-conditioned cider in the spring of 2005, cider sales have increased threefold," says **Jim Anderson**, resident Beer Geek at The Anderson. "This interest in a return to artesianal cider bodes well for what Ryefield is doing." The Anderson has been recommended both by **The Good**

Beer Guide and Good Beer Guide Belgium for their selection of real ale & cider as well as their vast selection of Belgian ales.

The blind tasting will include six of Ryefield's ciders, which each guest will taste and rate as to appearance, aroma, flavour and balance. The results of the tasting will go directly to Ryefield for use in shaping the flavour profile of the final product, which they plan to make commercial in the near future, both in 750ml bottles and limited-edition casks. Admission to the tasting is £15 per person, and will include the ciders, an apple-based buffet from the highly-regarded kitchen of The Anderson, as well as a 10% discount on dinner that evening. A package that includes the tasting and B & B is available for £35 per person

"Cider fans can now enjoy a fantastic range of drinks at Wetherspoon pubs and Lloyds bars. All of the company's outlets (with the exception of airport sites) are serving six ciders, many of which are not normally available outside of the areas in which they are produced. The range features Westons organic vintage draught cider, Westons Old Rosie cloudy scrumpy draught cider and Westons bottled cider, as well as Thatchers Perry (bottled cider made from pears), Magners Irish cider and Sheppy's Oakwood flagon."

We have heard that Weston's Old Rosie is being served in the King's Highway. Ed.

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
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Rating the Beer

I've just finished a fortnight in Scotland, and picked up your excellent newsletter at Scourie. Having come across the invitation to rate the beer, and had a look at the form on the website (and being only on a dial-up internet connection) I decided it would take too long to fill in 'n' forms, so I hope you will accept these comments, although I realise that you won't use them as GBG judgements.

However, there maybe some new info. in here for you. If you want to use anything in here as the basis for a 'filler' for the newsletter, I've no objections. I'm also aware that some of these places are outside your area, but have included them anyway. Please excuse idiosyncratic diversions ... and thanks for the information on where to drink on my annual visits up north (ie: not just the GBG ones).

I am a lapsed CAMRA member (joined in 1974, lapsed about 10 years later (other commitments), but I always drink the proper stuff).

25th June - **The Crown** at Biggar: Sorry, forgot to note what it was, but gave it 3. **Old Mill**, Aviemore: The most expensive beer in the Highlands (and probably anywhere else in the UK, outside the effete South East, for that matter). Still, the Trade Winds rated a 3.

The Highlander, Craigellachie: The pub had been in new hands for 'about a week' and had Cairngorm Trade Winds. Also a 3. The food was up to its usual standard. New licensee seemed friendly enough, if a bit too earnest.

Mash Tun, Aberlour: Also Trade Winds.

I'd give it a 3. I've had better here in previous years, but still no complaints. 26th June - **Ferry Boat**, Ullapool: Deuchars IPA. Only a 1. It hadn't had a chance to settle. Caley 80/-: 2. Pub the same as it has been for the last 'n' years, including many of the regulars!

Am Fuaran, Altandhu (near Achiltibuie): Didn't expect to find real ale, but they had Dundonnell An Teallach. Competently kept, but it was just too warm, and that on a chilly day! (It makes a change from those places round here where the ale is just too cold). Rated it at 2, would have been 3 if just a little cooler. The place has had some renovation since I was last here, and the food is now good.

Summer Isles Bar, Achiltibuie: Skyelight (from Uig): The first time I've come across the beer, but wonderful, and worth a 4. They also had Hebridean Gold (not tried), and another (not tried or remembered!). Good atmosphere amongst the locals (as it always seems to be) - landlady friendly.


27th June - **Old Inn**, Gairloch: Dundonnell An Teallach, which was a 3, and Skye Blind Piper of Gairloch (the house beer - a blend of Black Cuillin and Blaven? you tell me!), a 4. Only 3 beers on - the other was Greene King Abbot - but others ready to go on 'shortly'. They said their policy was for up to 6 beers: a weaker and a stronger English one, a weaker and a stronger Scottish one, and one from each of their local breweries (Dundonnell and Skye), but you'll know that anyway. A nice idea to offer customers a snifter of the beers in a small glass.

Argyll, Ullapool: Dundonnell An Teallach,

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Inverness & Highland CAMRA Country Pub-of-the-Year for 2004

scored at 3. (The other was Red Cuillin).

Am Fuaran, Altandhu: Has to be rated 0.

The An Teallach was poured; I looked at it, then at the barman: obvious end-of-barrel; he took it back. There was no more available, 'we only get a bit at this time of year, but sell more in the season'.

Summer Isles, Achiltibuie: Skyelight again, and another 4. I'm now welcomed with a 'hello Dave'.

28th June - **Tongue Hotel**, Tongue: Deuchars IPA, and a 2, but after 2 pints it finishes, and there is no suggestion of putting a new barrel on.

Craggan Hotel, Melness: Unfortunately still no real ale, which is a pity, as it's the best food for miles!

29th June - **Mey Arms**, Mey, and **Northern Sands**, Dunnet: No real ale.

Melvich Hotel, Melvich: Fast Reactor. Afraid I can only give it a 1.5 (can I do that?). It was too young, and hadn't quite cleared, but was going down well with a party of tourists, who ordered a jug brought through from the lounge. 30th June / 1st July - Scourie Hotel, Scourie: Castle Eden (plus one other not recorded). I could only give it a 2 for each visit. On the first visit it was a new barrel, and the beer was fine enough, but there were a few snarlies in the glass, which suggests that the lines aren't cleaned as often as they might be. A shame to see so many English beers on the 'Coming Next' list, when I'd like to sample a more local product. Live music was pleasant enough (and more sober than when I was here last year!).

Kylesku Hotel, Kylesku: Under new management, and the food is as good as usual, but, as usual, no real ale.

2nd July - Camping on the West Coast with gales forecast didn't seem to be a good idea, so.....


The Anderson, Fortrose: Directors, which was a 3 - might have been more but Directors isn't one of my favourites. (The other beer was Helga's Big Juggs). Friendly licensee - American? - who amused himself and his son by playing at waterpistols in the yard, then having a conversation with me while he was on top of the fire escape, and me on the ground. Good potential!

Plough, Rosemarkie: Have to confess that I was so engrossed in the fall of Australian wickets on the TV that I forgot to note the name of the beer, but it was a 4. Highlander, Craigellachie: Now with two real ales. McMullens AK, which rated 3, and Trade Winds (not tried).

Mash Tun, Aberlour: Houston Killellan, and another 3. The 'internationally acclaimed and world-famed band' (Coconut Dog) turned out to be 4 local lads (we've all been there), good fiddler, competent acoustic guitars and bass, and crap vocals. 3rd July - Udny Arms, Newborough: Directors again, and a 3. The soup was good. Country Park Inn, Mintlaw: Afraid it was Orkney Skull Splitter, and I'm not sampling that at 5 o'clock on a Sunday afternoon! If there's only one real ale, please can it be sensible.

Hope this is useful, and forgive the idiosyncracies. Dave.

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Focus on John Barron

ABV 3.8%

John Barron is a Branch founder member and a regular on Branch outings to pubs and breweries. John is retired and lives with his wife in Inverness.

Q: Where do you originate from?

A: I was born in 1927 in Dornoch and I spent my early years there and in Aberdeen. In 1938 my parents came back to Inverness where I have lived ever since, except for a spell in the Royal Marines from 1945 to 1948, and six years in Edinburgh studying Classics and Law and serving a law apprentice.

Q: What made you settle in this area?

A: I chose Law partly at least because it would let me work in Inverness, and I did spend my working life as a solicitor in a local firm from which I retired in

1992. For twelve of these years I was also a part-time public prosecutor.

Q: Why did you join CAMRA?

A: It was a Branch member. John Aird. who introduced me to CAMRA but I am a little vague about my introduction to real ale itself When I first became familiar with beer in the mid 1940's most beers were what we now call real ale and this persisted until relentless brewery takeovers and closures and the spread of keg beers changed the traditional scene.

Q: Your favourite beers/beer styles?

A: In my Edinburgh days my regular tipple was a 'Happy Day' - a Fowlers Prestonpans Wee Heavy in a pint glass topped up with Bernards or Campbell Hope and King's Heavy. I suppose this

was real ale albeit blended in the glass. At any rate a Happy Day cost less than two shillings and so a ten bob note (50p) was sufficient funding for Saturday night. I don't have any single favourite beer or style and I like to sample as many real ales as I can, both Scottish and English, and the choice and quality now seem better than ever. I am rather partial to the products of the small breweries of northern Scotland. I recall being pleasantly surprised to find Orkney Dark Island drawn direct from a wooden barrel in deepest Cornwall. It travelled well.

Q: What do you look for in a good pub?

A: The way the beer is kept and the feeling of being made welcome are most important but I find so much else depends on subjective factors such as the company one is in; one's state of mind at the time, and even the degree

of thirst. But defiantly no loud music and not too much smoke. Some of my favourites in this area: Clachnaharry Inn, Cawdor Tavern, Heatherbrae in Nethy Bridge, Cairn in Carrbridge and the Kimberly in Findhorn.

- Q: You always go on our Branch day trips. Which was your favourite?
- A: All the outings have been enjoyable, north, south, east, west; but perhaps the annual trip to Skye stands out.
- Q: What are your hobbies?
- A: I am an omnivorous reader and my outdoor pastimes are walking and cycling in our wonderful countryside (more so the older one gets), and the cultivation of the soil. In my earlier years I was a keen hill walker and I still run a Church walking group which, I am glad to say, enjoys a stop at any real ale pub on the homeward journey.

* Orkney Brewery - Brewing commenced in March 1988 at the old schoolhouse in Sandwick. Ales include Dark Island, Red MacGregor, and Skullsplitter.

Isle of Skye Brewery - Based at Uig by the Western Isles ferry terminal, and has been brewing since December 1995. Ales include Red & Black Cuillin, Hebridean Gold, and Blaven. Seasonal, House, and special event ales are regularly brewed.

Valhalla Brewery - The most northerly brewery in the UK started brewing on the island of Unst in December 1997. Ales include White Wife and Auld Rock.

Black Isle Brewery - Started brewing in December 1998 in converted farm buildings. Ales include Red Kite and Yellowhammer. Organic ales are a speciality.

Far North Brewery - Melvich brewpub. Ales include Real Mackay & Fast Reactor.

Isle of Arran Brewery - Located close to Brodick Castle. Opened late March 2000. Ales include Blond and Dark.

Fyne Ales Brewery - Based in Argyll, at the head of Loch Fyne, brewing started on St Andrew's Day 2001. Ales include Piper's Gold and Maverick.





Cairngorm Brewery Company - Set up in late 2001 to market the beers of the Tomintoul & Aviemore breweries, which they own. Ales include Trade Winds, Wildcat, Stag, Highland IPA, and Black Gold. Seasonal ales are regularly brewed.

Hebridean Brewing Company - Based at Stornoway in the Outer Hebrides. Began brewing in January 2002, now producing five regular and some seasonal ales. Beers include Clansman Ale (first ale ever brewed in Stornoway), Islander Strong Ale & Berserker Export Pale Ale.



* Atlas Brewery - Brewing in one of the old Aluminium Smelter buildings at Kinlochleven since February 2002. Ales include Lati-BREWERY tude, Wayfarer and Nimbus.

An Teallach Brewery - Brewing moved to the family croft at Camusnagaul, near Dundonnell, during March 2003. Ales include An Teallach Ale, Crofter's Pale Ale, and Beinn Dearg.

Islay Ales Co Ltd - Established in an old Tractor Shed in Bridgend, in March 2004. Ales include Finlaggan and Blackrock.

Cuillin Brewery - The brewery was born on September the 10th, 2004, in the old public bar of the Sligachan Hotel. Skye and Eagle Ales are brewed.

Highland Brewing Company - Started brewing in late 2004 at Moorhouses (Lancs). Brewery is to be located in the old Swannay cheese factory at Birsay, on Orkney.

Oyster Brewery - Located in Ellenabeich, on the Isle of Seil, near Oban. Set up late in 2004, first brews in the Spring of 2005. Ales include Easd' Ale, Red Pearl, and Oyster Gold.

Isle of Mull Brewery - Started in May 2005 with a 5 barrel plant in Tobermory. McCaig's Folly and Galleon Gold ales.

* The Atlas and Orkney Breweries merged in 2004 to form a new business, called Highlands and Islands Breweries, but are dedicated to developing the two brands at the existing breweries.

Not all of the breweries listed are in our branch area & Orkney are all in the Aberdeen, Grampian & Northern Isles area; : Arran Brewery s in the Ayrshire & lloway are Ales, ea; while Islav Ales, ' & Ovster Breweries covered by Glasgow & tland. - 2 Average. Competently kept, drinkable pint but doesn't inspire in any way, not worth moving to another pub but you drink the beer without really noticing.
- **3** Good. Good beer in good form. You may cancel plans to move to the next pub. You want to stay for another pint and may seek out the beer again.
- 4 Very Good. Excellent beer in excellent condition.
- **5 Excellent**. Probably the best you are ever likely to find. A seasoned drinker will award this score very rarely.

We would really welcome your regular input, to help ensure that local pubs who consistently serve good quality real ale make it into the 2007 Good Beer Guide.



Carry-Out Caravanners

As lovers of Scotland and of real ale, we decided to spend our main holiday north of the border and do some sampling. We took our touring caravan, aiming to spend 5 nights in Oban area, 5 at Craigellachie and 5 at Scone.

We would have loved to include the full

article, but we pick up the story as our happy caravanners approach our area Ed. Our next trip out was in Oban on Sunday and we tried Isle of Mull McCaig's Folly 4.2 and Atlas Three Sisters 4.2 in the Oban Inn. The Atlas beer was not up to standard but the Isle of Mull was fine. On our way back to site, we collected a pint of Fyne Highlander 4.8 from the Wide Mouthed Frog. We often take beer back to the caravan in plastic pint milk bottles, and this was enjoyed with our evening meal.

Monday saw us heading out on a tour round some Good Beer Guide pubs. We went up to Fort William to try the 2 pubs there. Ray drives and I do the imbibing, so at Nevisport I had Atlas Wayfarer 4.4 and took a pint of Isle of Skye Red Cuillen 4.2 back for later, and at the Grog and Gruel I had An Tealloch Brewhouse Special 4.4 and took An Tealloch Kildonan 4.4 in a bottle. Both were very friendly bars and all the beers went down well.

Our next port of call was the Tailrace at Kinlochleven where I enjoyed a much better Atlas Three Sisters 4.2. While here we tried to visit Atlas Brewery but found that they were cleaning and were not open to visitors. We carried on to the Clachaig Inn at Glencoe, and here there was a lot of choice and we had fun with

the bar staff as we filled 3 bottles to take out. Atlas Nimbus 5.0, Isle of Skye Black Cuillin 4.5 and Isle of Skye Red Cuillin 4.2. All were enjoyed later.

We went in search of a new brewery on Tuesday and traveled down to the Oyster Bar at Ellenabeich on the Isle of Seil. I had Oyster Floridale 4.2 and Oyster Old Tosser 5.0. Both the beers were in good condition and much enjoyed but unfortunately Ray was unable to have any as this was the only bar on our holiday that refused to fill our milk bottles. We had rung ahead the day before to see the brewery, but on the day were told that the brewer was not available and they needed 48 hours notice.

We called at the Tigh-an Truish Clachan Seil on the way back to get some beer for the evening session, and they filled our pint milk bottles with Caledonian Deuchers IPA 3.8 and Fyne Maverick 4.2, both of which we enjoyed back at the caravan site.

On Wednesday we caught the ferry to visit the Isle of Mull and took the bus to Tobermory to visit the brewery at Mac-Gochan's bar. I had an excellent Isle of Mull McCaig's Folly 4.5 and we took a pint back for the evening session.

We traveled up to Craigellachie on Thursday so did not go out till Friday when we went to a garage in Inverness to have the car brakes looked at. While there we were not far from the Clacknaharry Inn so called there for lunch. What a gem. I had Cameron's Long Leg 4.8 and we had a pint of Hebridean Celtic Festivale 4.2, both in excellent condition. George told us about Rob Hill's Highland Brewing Co.

that had recently set up on Orkney, and that he had Scapa Special in the cellar that would be on over the weekend, so we decided we would make the trip again to sample it.

Saturday saw us off on another tour. We started at Elgin where Flannagan's filled the bottles with Kelburn Dark Moor 4.5 and Houston Barochan 4.1. I had a Cairngorm Wild Cat 5.1 in the Muckle Cross, and then we had a bottle filled with Houston Marilyn's Draught 3.9 at the Sunninghill. We went to the Gordon Arms Hotel at Fochabers but did not have a drink there, followed by the Mash Tun at Charlestown of Aberlour where I had a Cairngorm Trade Winds 4.3 before going back to the caravan to enjoy the excellent ales collected during the day.

Sunday we were going back to Inverness, but called at Findhorn on the way. Two brilliant bars here with friendly staff and customers making our visit very enjoyable. We had a bottle of Cairngorm Black Gold 4.4 at the Crown and Anchor, and at the Kimberley I had Cairngorm Sheepshaggers Gold 4.5 and we took a bottle of Black Isle Heather Honey Beer 4.7 back with us. At the Clachnaharry Inn I had a Highland Brewing Co Scapa Special 4.2 and we also took a pint back with us. We went on to the Plough at Rosemarkie where I had An Teallach Beinn Dearg 3.8 and we took a pint of An Teallach Crofters Pale Ale 4.2 back with us. At Andersons I had Robinson's Sunny Jim 3.8 and we took a pint of that one back too. On our way back we traveled down all the one



track roads to find the Black Isle Brewery but arrived at 5.00 on the dot and discovered that they closed at 5.00 on a Sunday so we missed out again. We discovered another friendly bar at Alves on the way back. The Crooked Inn served an excellent Cairngorm Witches Cauldron 4.9 and we took a pint back too.

On Monday 1.8.05 we decided to work our way along the coast and headed for Banff.

Our reporters filled their milk bottles several more times along the north east coast, and enjoyed their time at Scone. They took a train to Edinburgh on Friday 5.8.05 so that they could both have a drink in the bars, and a marathon ale sampling day it was too. We pick up the story again on their last day when they visited two of Scotland:s finest.

Saturday 6.8.05 was to be our last day in Scotland and we went up to Blairgowrie to the Ericht Alehouse. News of Brews

I had a beer in the box from the Cairngorm Brewery on the 16th June which was an experimental Heather Ale, and "Good" it was too. I don't know what the story is behind it (I was in too much of a rush) but it will be interesting to know how and whether this becomes an addition to their range, and where they are getting the heather from - is there any tie-up with the more famous heather brew, for example? JH, Newtonmore Atlas Latitude tied with Hanby Ales' Shropshire Stout for Champion Beer of

Walsall 2005 at their April festival. In

July Walsall CAMRA members travelled to the brewery to present the award.

Isle of Skye Brewery have brought out a special beer to commemorate their 1,000th brew. 'Skye's Grand Ale' is a 4.3% brew and contains torrified wheat, lager malt, and Hersbrukken and Goldings hops. It is a light golden colour, very dry and refreshing.

Isle of Mull Brewery started brewing in May, with a 5 barrel plant behind Mac-Gochans Bar in Tobermory. Two beers are currently brewing, McCaig's Folly`4.2%, and Galleon Gold (5% fruity blonde ale). The beers are named after

Trade Winds, blowing in the right direction for Cairngorm

The Cairngorm Brewery scooped the prestigious Champion Speciality Beer of Britain award with their fine ale "Trade Winds" at the 2005 Great British Beer Festival held by CAMRA, the consumer organisation, at Olympia in London in August.

This is the second year running that Trade Winds has won this top honour and the company can now regard itself as one of Scotland's leading breweries being the only Scottish brewery to gain a placing in this UK competition.

The beer is noted as a speciality beer due to additional natural flavours being mixed with the hops. Sean Tomlinson, Brewing Manager for Cairngorm, describes the beer "as having a light golden colour with a high proportion of wheat and corn giving it a clean fresh taste, on top of which there is masses of hops, fruit and citrus flavours".

The brewery has built an outstanding reputation for quality. As well as winning the GBBF Champion Speciality category, the brewery has also won the Champion Beer of Scotland for two years running and also runner up position this year.

The brewery is based in Aviemore in the Highlands and Managing Director, Robbie Walker commented, "The number of quality awards that the brewery has received over the last 18 months is exceptional and really cements the reputation of the company for quality".

But it's not only the quality reputation of the company that's improving. Merlin Sandbach, Sales Manager, commented "consumers, publicans and wholesalers alike demand quality and such success and exposure really creates a point of difference between Cairngorm and the competition." He added that significant growth has been realised both for cask and bottled product.



Find out the best pubs to visit in towns, cities, and the countryside throughout the UK. For each of the 4,500 pub entries you will find full details of beer food, entertainment, family facilities, history, and architecture.

The guide contains an expanded Breweries Section which lists every brewery that produces cask beer. The majority of beers have tasting notes provided by trained CAMRA tasting panels. Keep up to date on the brewing scene, and find out who is in, and who is out this year.

CAMRA Members can purchase the GBG 2006 from their branch committee for £10:00. This is a saving of £3.99, and gives the local branch a small profit which is used to promote branch activities in support of local pubs and breweries.

Good Beer Guide 2006

This year we have nominated a record 33 Highlands & Islands pubs for the guide, including five new entries -

Alexander Bain, Wick
Bothy Bar, Fort Augustus
Bosville Hotel, Portree
Glenmoriston Hotel, Invermoriston
Whaler's Rest, Stornoway

The Alexander Bain in Wick, the most northerly Wetherspoon outlet, has been converted from a telephone exchange. Caledonian Deuchars IPA and 80/- are served, plus a variety of guest beers.

The **Bothy** in Fort Augustus is beside the Caledonian Canal and on the Great Glen Way. Two handpumps serve mainly Isle of Skye Brewery beers plus an occasional guest from Cairngorm Brewery.

The atmosphere in the **Bosville Hotel** is both friendly and relaxing. The hotel, which overlooks Portree harbour, boasts an award winning restaurant.

The Glenmoriston Arms Hotel in Invermoriston is another ideal stopping point along the Great Glen Way, Loch Ness, and the road to Skye. Isle of Skye Brewery beers are on handpump in the Tavern Bar and from the wood in the Morison Bar.

The Whaler's Rest in Stornoway is the first GBG entry for the Outer Hebrides island of Lewis. There are occasional guest beers in addition to two regular beers from the local Hebridean Brewery.

The family-owned **Cawdor Tavern**, listed in the guide in the 80's and early 90's, makes a welcome return. One Cairngorm brew and award winning food are served.

The number of pubs which we consider merit inclusion in the Good Beer Guide has grown almost every year and, until now, all pubs recommended by the branch have been included. For the 2006 edition of the guide the committee were faced with the unenviable task of deciding which pubs to put forward and which not to. The number of pubs in the Highlands & Islands serving GBG-quality real ale now exceeds our allocation of 33.

(Orkney and Shetland pubs are listed in the guide under Highlands & Islands, but are submitted by Aberdeen, Grampian and Northern Isles branch). Recommendations for inclusion in the guide are based upon reports on the ale quality received from CAMRA members. All reports are carefully recorded by the branch, and help us to monitor the quality of real ale throughout the year. Please keep sending in your pub reports.

As publicised in "What's Brewing", the CAMRA monthly newspaper, GBG 2006 is available to members at the specially discounted price of £8.50 if purchased at a branch meeting in October or November. Our AGM on 8th November qualifies as a branch meeting, but please let us know beforehand if you want to buy a copy.

The new GBG is on the streets, and our Branch year is drawing to a close. Local brewers continue to go from strength to strength and real ale is ever more widely available in the Highlands & Islands. Of course quantity does not guarantee quality, and the real ale scene is ever-changing, but reports do indicate that there is an ever larger number of pubs selling high quality ales. Currently there is no shortage of new brewers, and more publicans are trying real ale. We wish them all every success.

Annual General Meeting

The Annual General Meeting of the Inverness & Highlands Branch of CAMRA will be held on Tuesday 8th November 2005 in the Clachnaharry Inn, Inverness. All local branch members are invited to attend. Please make every effort to come along and support your Branch. So what do the local committee do?

With <u>your</u> help we monitor real ale outlets in our area and recommend, for entry into the Good Beer Guide, pubs which consistently serve good quality real ale. We organise the annual Pubs-of-the-Year (POTY) vote, and then decide which pub goes forward to represent Inverness & Highland in the overall Scottish Pubs-of-the-Year. We launched a website in February 2005 to provide up-to-date information about Highlands & Islands breweries, pubs, and beer festivals; plus items of interest.

If you would like to play an active part in the local real ale scene (other than just drinking the ale!!) then please let us know. Additional pairs of hands on committee would be very helpful, but simply keeping us up-to-date with the ale quality in the pubs in your area is a significant contribution. All contributions are very welcome.


18 Jun - Plockton Hotel/Skye/Hebridean Gold/3, Caledonian/Deuchars IPA/4
